

REPORT

OF THE

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

OF THE

TOWN OF ACUSHNET,

FOR THE YEAR 1884-5.

Your School Committee are reminded that another year has rolled around, and that we must at this time give an account of our administration.

The highest welfare of our Commonwealth is closely connected with the education of its children. There is no interest under the care of the State of so great importance; and that town that makes liberal appropriations for its schools is truly wise.

Gen. Washington once said, "No nation can expect to prosper if the education of the people be neglected." Such is the feeling of all classes at the present day. The results of the schools, taken collectively, the past year, have been of a satisfactory and praiseworthy nature. In selecting teachers it has been our rule to obtain the best we could for the compensation.

Our schools have suffered much the past winter from sickness. This is especially true of the Perry Hill school, which has been badly broken up. The great distance some of the children live from the schoolhouse, makes it very inconvenient, and almost impossible for the smaller ones to attend school, consequently quite a number have attended school in Mattapoisett. This is quite an expense, as a bill of \$60 has already been presented to our town for the tuition of these children through the Spring and Fall terms.

The present condition of our schools, when compared with the past, affords us much encouragement to advance in our efforts, and your committee cordially invite the cooperation of parents with teachers for the purpose of maintaining those principles, which will make our schools successful.

In conclusion, we would say that we have felt the sacredness of the trust confided to us and have tried to do our duty.
