SCHOOL REPORT.

The School Committee herewith present their report for the school year ending February 27, 1892:

• At the first meeting of the Board organization was effected as follows:

Chairman—D. T. Devoll. Secretary—E. W. Ashley.

And assignments were made, viz. :

Long Plain and Bisbee—Mr. Ashley. Acushnet Grammar and Primary—Mr. Morse. Perry Hill and Whelden—Mr. Devoll.

At the beginning the Committee found itself somewhat handicapped, from the fact that the change in the annual meeting from April to March brought the school year out wrong.

We have been forced to make long terms and short vacations, so as to redeem, in a measure, the time lost, and make the requisite time of schooling finish with the Town year. A portion of this time so lost has been redeemed, and by another year it is hoped to make the change so it will end all right.

Our schools have been in session in all during the year thirty-four weeks.

Some needed repairs and improvements have been made to the school-houses, among them may be noticed those at the Acushnet school, and at Long Plain, and minor repairs at Perry Hill and Whelden. A policy of the Committee has been, whenever it is practicable, to employ our own town's people as teachers, and although oftentimes it is a dangerous experiment, yet in our own case it has been found to be, so far as tried, satisfactory. Our corps of teachers as they stand in our schools to-day would make favorable comparison with any of our towns, and all of them are earnest, practical, efficient, and thoroughly interested with the work and the children they teach. The notion that anyone can teach a country school only needs for its cure a half day's visit to any of our schools. There are few positions in life that call for more versatility and tact than to teach and discipline an ungraded school, where the years of the scholars vary from 5 to 16.

At one of our schools we have quite a number in attendance from a neighboring town, for which tuition is charged at what the Committee consider a fair rate.

The past year brought to the surface certain legislation effecting schools, the most important of which is that known as the High School Act. In a measure this effects us now, and is liable to do so yet more in the future, as the pupils in the lower grades grow older.
