School Report, Town of Acushnet,

1892-93.

The School Committee for the town of Acushnet herewith present their annual report.

The school year which closed Feb. 10, 1893, has been a progressive one, and the committee feel that the schools are in a better condition than ever before.

The school buildings throughout the town are in good condition, the corps of teachers earnest and efficient, and the committee have sought to give the schools facilities for work equal to the best of ungraded schools.

That our schools have something more than a town reputation will be conceded when it is stated that we have eight pupils from other towns attending regularly the sessions under our care.

The High school act which allows the attendance of pupils in the neighboring city at the town's expense has been made available, and the committee learn that the pupils so attending are doing good work and making a creditable showing for the town. Under the provisions of this act four are now attending the New Bedford High School, at an annual cost of about \$55 each.

The school year past has been marked by several things out of the usual in their care, and a brief reference to them here would seem to be proper.

The first is the difficulty with the school committee of Mattapoisett in the matter of attendance of certain of our children at the Tinkhamtown school. This alleged claim was a legacy left by former committees, and properly left if your committee is credibly informed. The present committee always declined paying the claim, and when it was stated in the school report of Mattapoisett last year that our town was indebted to it in a large sum, and they had assurance that it would be paid, they made a statement that had no foundation in fact. The stand always taken by your Board was that the matter was not one for them to adjudicate upon, but was a claim against the town, if any existed, that was a proper matter for the selectmen, your committee acting, if at all, as an advisory board. At the close of some correspondence a joint meeting of the above boards was held, and a representative from each empowered to settle this matter, which they did at a compromise figure.

The committee are glad to report that with the exception of the High school scholars, as before noted, all our children are

cared for in our schools.

The second matter of more than ordinary significance was the celebration of October 21, 1892, as Columbus Day. Our teachers and pupils all took hold of this matter with zeal, and the exhibition was a most creditable one. Few school events of modern days have enlisted in so brief a time such a vast army of workers as this did, and its beneficent influence cannot be otherwise than a valued teacher of patriotism.

Every one of our schools is now provided with an American flag and flagstaff, and the scholars all take much pride in hav-

ing it raised over their buildings in suitable weather.

The extremely cold weather of this winter taxed the heating capacity of many of our buildings that are exposed, and in some of them it was with difficulty that all were kept comfortably warm. In consequence of the above conditions an unusual supply of fuel was called for in several of the schools.

Our schools have been in session thirty-six weeks.

The organization of the Board at the opening meeting was as follows: Chairman, Daniel T. Devoll; Secretary, Charles M. Morse, Jr.

The assignments were as follows: Perry Hill and Whelden, George J. Parker; Acushnet Primary and Grammar, Charles M. Morse, Jr.; Long Plain and Bisbee, Daniel T. Devoll.
