ACUSHNET FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The Free Public Library of Acushnet has had a prosperous year. The circulation at the village was nearly double that of the previous year, as 2,927 books were given out. Through the added grant of the town we have been enabled since April to open the library twice a week, on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, and to provide a reading table supplied with popular magazines and illustrated papers. This opportunity is especially appreciated by the scholars and other young people of Acushnet. Through the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Clement Swift a loan exhibit of antiquities from Acushnet was held at their spacious home in October. The net proceeds, \$32.50, were given to the library. It is hoped that a similar exhibition may be given in the future, which will be patronized more by our townspeople. This exhibit involved a great deal of planning, care, time, and labor, but Mr. and Mrs. Swift felt rewarded by the success of their undertaking.

Miss Elsie Collins and Mrs. Geo. A. Fuller continue as librarians. The librarian at Long Plain, Miss Florence Manter, resigned last fall, after several years of faithful service. Miss Sophronia Veazie is her successor.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF ACUSHNET:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report concerning the work and condition of the schools of the town which you serve.

To be the bearer of a cheerful and encouraging report is always a pleasant task. We are impelled to believe that those who have kept in close touch with school affairs and interests in the past two years have had many reasons for rejoicing. For the benefit of those who have not had either the time or inclination to know what has been taking place, I want to say that the educational interests of Acushnet have taken a greater step in advance in the past two years, than in the preceding decade.

This educational revival, I think we may call it, began when the town decided to build a new schoolhouse to replace the over-crowded and much worn building at Acushnet, where for two years, work had been done under hampered and disagreeable conditions.

This was a good beginning, but even after the town had spent nearly \$6,000, there yet remained much to be done, not only inside, but outside and around this most excellent and attractive building. While keenly desiring to complete the work so well begun, it was not possible, until the neighborly gift of \$5,000 gave new impetus and courage, and withal the means of accomplishing unexpected, yet highly desirable improvements, beside many necessary repairs, which must otherwise have fallen heavily upon the town.

A brief resumé of the material improvements made during the last year will be of interest. At the Acushnet school, new cement floors were made in the basement, new double floors were laid to replace the wretched floors in the old portion of

the building, new adjustable chairs and desks were installed, the whole building was furnished with most satisfactory and durable slate blackboards. The purchase of a corner lot on the west and about three-fourths of an acre in the rear gave an ample lot and play ground for this sightly building. The whole area from street to rear line was cleared and properly graded; the portion back of the building having been leveled for the children's play ground, while the front was plotted for a lawn, with suitable walks and driveways. The outbuildings were put in shape, with proper vaults, so that a successful attempt could be made to secure a greater degree of civilization in regard to their care and use. The Friends' society promptly met the committee half way in the re-building of the wall on the north line.

All in all, this splendid building, well lighted and heated, with new and clean floors, modern furniture, the best of blackboards, ample grounds and wholesome surroundings, furnishes a genuine foundation and stimulus for a better spirit in and about the school. This new environment has had a marked effect upon teachers and scholars.

Since your committee has felt the necessity of getting along with as economical appropriations as possible, only absolutely necessary repairs have been made from year to year, but the time had arrived when considerable outlay must be made at Long Plain. The floor which had become worn and open and consequently very cold, was replaced, new adjustable desks provided, and the walls in the grammar room fitted with slate blackboards. The windows and blinds were all re-fitted and properly adjusted. At this building also a new cement floor was made in the basement. In place of the old fence, which was not a credit to the town because of its age and condition, there was substituted a very neat and substantial one which greatly improves the appearance of this splendid school lot. In general, the expenditure of about \$1,200 upon and around the Long Plain school has not only put the building and

grounds in such shape as to arouse local pride, but has furnished cleaner, more comfortable and satisfactory conditions for all concerned.

Those who are most closely connected with the every day work and needs of the schools, have the greatest appreciation of what it means for a town to have such excellent buildings and unusually good grounds. It has always been said that *environment* has a powerful effect upon people, and this truth has been clearly demonstrated in the case of both teachers and pupils, who are working under these new conditions. Give children that in which they take pride, and it will not be misused. Defacement of all sorts has been almost entirely absent. The work of instruction has been carried on with less friction and with a better spirit.

From the regular town appropriation considerable has been done at the other schools. Perry Hill has had new steps and platform, and new blackboards; while the grounds have been improved by grading. At Whelden the grounds were cleared of bushes and loose stones. A new fence encloses the lot at Bisbee, where other minor repairs have been made.

While all this advance has been made in material things, which have surely exerted an unconscious influence, we have not lost sight of the direct efforts to furnish excellent instruction. Although we lost good teachers last June, I can say, without being trite, that I have never seen your schools as a whole in charge of so efficient a corps of teachers. There are, however, weak places, which will, as the system is now organized, of necessity always exist.

I wish briefly to call you attention to the preceding financial report, as well as to the statistics for enrollment, attendance, etc. First, you will note there has been a steady increase of pupils (47) since 1901, which has involved the salary of another teacher and other increased expenditures for books and supplies, fuel, etc. However, you have had the good fortune to be able to make the same or smaller appropriations, and still meet

those increasing expenditures until now the limit has been reached. The following table shows how your appropriations have decreased since the state became so generous in 1903 and refunded the total cost of High school tuition :

Having been freed from this large bill for tuition, you actually raised for school purposes, in 1904, \$600 less than in 1902. By reason of this increased help from the state and the balance of \$601 in 1903 and \$311 in 1904, we have been able to postpone the time when we have to report, instead of a balance a deficit, which might, however, have been avoided if the state had returned at the proper time what was due on account of high school tuition.

After making a most careful estimate for next year, and deducting the probable income from outside sources, there remains the need for an appropriation of \$3,500, which was the total amount raised in 1902.

In closing this report, I wish to express my thanks for the confidence and assistance of your committee, and my genuine appreciation of those citizens who have rendered such unselfish services in making the educational efforts of teachers and officials more effective.
