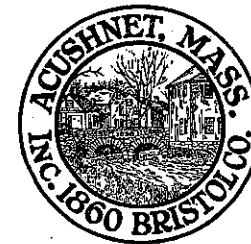

To the Citizens of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Selectmen hereby submit their report for the year ending December 31, 1942.

The Board organized March 9, 1942, as follows:

Mr. Henry L. Guilbeault was elected chairman of the Board of Selectmen and Public Welfare, and Miss Mary Viera re-appointed clerk.

On March 16, 1942, the Board appointed Mr. Frank Lloyd as Building Inspector

An audit was made by the Department of Corporations and Taxation of the accounts of the Town, the text of which may be found in this report.

Mr. Jerry J. Riendeau resigned as Treasurer, Collector and Town Clerk on September 1, 1942, and Mr. Allan L. Rawcliffe was temporarily appointed Treasurer and Collector, and Town Clerk, by the Board of Selectmen.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the former treasurer and collector of the town of Acushnet for the period from July 28, 1940, the date of the previous audit, to September 3, 1942, and of the books and accounts of the former town clerk for the period from January 1 to September 3, 1942, and report thereon as follows:

The books and accounts of the former town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were compared with the collector's records of payments to the treasurer and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were compared with the approved selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash balance on September 3, 1942, was proved by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank in which town funds are deposited and by verification of a deposit in transit.

The recorded payments of maturing debt and interest were checked with the amounts falling due and compared with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the trust funds in custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the withdrawals were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

The tax title records were examined and the amounts transferred to the tax title account were checked with the collector's records. The reported redemptions were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts and the tax titles on hand were listed and further verified by comparison with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the former collector were examined and checked. The town and district tax accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitments, were audited. The cash book additions were verified, the payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were checked with the assessor's records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were reconciled with the town accountant's ledger accounts.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to all persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town and the district, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The total amounts outstanding on each of the several town and district tax levies were given to the board of assessors for use in preparing the recommitment, and detailed lists of the taxes outstanding were prepared for use of the new collector.

The former town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses issued were examined, the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book, and the payments to the State being verified by comparison with the receipts on file.

Appended to this report are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the town and district

taxes, and of the tax title accounts, together with tables showing the transactions and condition of the trust funds.

For the cooperation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR

To the selectmen and residents of Acushnet:

The department of Building Inspection respectfully submits the following report for the year 1942.

At the last Town meeting, it was voted to approve the office of inspector of buildings. That was a step in a forward direction which has been proved by all successful towns and cities. In the past we have been permitted to build, alter or construct any type of building, with no consideration for our neighbors or our town. That this consideration is necessary has been proved by the many fires which have destroyed homes and farms. The firemen have had only a slim chance to save anything but the basement. There is nothing wrong with our fire department or its equipment. Therefore the fault lies elsewhere, and you and I can place our finger on the spot if we take time to think. It must therefore be in buildings and if you will look around your own homes, you will find that many of them have been built with no thought of fire prevention or even with any thought at all.

That the Office of Building Inspection is going to be able to change this deplorable condition depends entirely upon the cooperation of all the residents and owners of property in the town. Therefore if you will study the following Building Laws, you will see where you can help to build a better town for the future.

It is now my duty to see that these laws are obeyed and the penalties applied to all violators. I am giving due warning that this is the law.

In the past nine months I have issued permits for fifty-two buildings in course of erection or alteration. Most of them were

started without permission and they only obtained permits after being notified they had been violating the law. The excuse in all cases was that they did not know that they had to have permission. I wish to call attention to the regulations issued by the Office of War Priorities Board that anyone wishing to build must keep within their restrictions and that a permit issued by me in no way covers any violation of the W.P.B. rules and regulations.

The following are the building laws of Acushnet:

Article I.

ADMINISTRATION AND PERMITS

Sec. 1. These by-laws shall be known and cited as the Building Laws. No building, structure, or part thereof shall hereafter be constructed, altered, moved or built upon except in conformity with the provisions of these Building Laws.

Sec. 2. Exceptions. The provisions of these Building Laws shall apply to municipal as well as to private dwellings, but shall not apply to bridges, or to buildings or other structures owned or occupied by the United States, or by the Commonwealth.

Sec. 3. Building Dept. Shall consist of an Inspector of Buildings, and such other inspectors as may be authorized by the Board of Selectmen. The Building Department shall so far as permitted by law be under the general charge and control of the Inspector. No person shall be in the employment of the

Building Dept. while he is financially interested directly or indirectly in performing work, furnishing materials, or making plans or specifications for buildings in this town not owned by him, for which a permit is required, nor shall any employee act upon any matter in which he has any financial interest.

The Inspector may authorize any responsible person to assist or act for him in the performance of his duties, subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen. Such deputy shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of said Inspector.

The Inspector shall have the right at any reasonable time in the performance of his duties to examine and inspect any premises, building or other structure within the town.

Sec. 4. Inspections. He shall promptly examine any building or structure reported to be damaged by fire or accident or to be in an unsafe or dangerous condition or to constitute a nuisance, and shall promptly take such action as the conditions demand. He shall report promptly to the proper State or Town officers any violation of these building laws or of any Statute or Regulation relating to buildings, and shall notify the Selectmen whenever, in his opinion, legal action should be instituted. He shall keep a detailed record of all permits issued, which shall be numbered consecutively, a record of all proceedings of his office and of all inspections, and examinations preserving the original notes thereof and a detailed record of all reported violations of these building laws. He shall make a written report to the Selectmen in January of each year.

Sec. 5. Permits shall be required (except as provided in Section 2) for construction of buildings as follows: for constructing, re-locating, or demolishing any building or part thereof including the excavation therefor providing building is more than 8' wide, 8' long and 7' high from floor to ceiling, and provided that permits shall not be required for repairs. No permit granted under the provisions of these building laws shall

relieve the applicant from any obligation to secure any other permit required by law for the construction or use of the building therein.

No person shall commence any work for which a permit is required before obtaining such permit: during all the progress of the work such permit shall be posted on the premises or otherwise available at all times for inspection on the premises during working hours.

No permit shall be issued until application for the same shall have been on file with the Inspector at least seven days, and during that time adjacent property owners shall have been notified of the intended construction and have been given a chance to register any complaint they may feel is justified. Upon such complaint having been made to the Inspector, a hearing upon the same shall be had before the next meeting of the Selectmen, and no permit shall be issued until the Inspector has the consent of the Selectmen.

Applications for permits shall be in writing, shall, if the Inspector requires, be on forms furnished by him, shall set forth the intended use of the building and such other facts as may be called for by the Inspector, and shall if required be verified by oath.

Every application for a permit to construct a building shall be accompanied by sketch, if required by the Inspector, showing sizes, position with reference to boundary lines and streets. If any part of a proposed building is to be within 50 feet of a street the applicant shall obtain and the Supt. of Streets shall furnish free of expense information and shall file said statement or plan with the Inspector before a permit for any excavation is issued.

These provisions shall apply only to building operations begun after these provisions become effective.

All permits shall be void if operations thereunder are not

commenced within ninety days after the date of the permit or if the operations thereunder are discontinued for a period of more than six months.

Sec. 6. If any person violates any of the requirements of these building laws or any amendment thereof or of any permit issued thereunder he shall except when otherwise provided in these building laws or by Statute be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$100. for each violation thereof. The Inspector upon discovery of such violation shall give notice thereof in writing to such person or to the owner of the premises where such violation occurs, and may order such person or owner to remove any part of a structure erected in violation thereof, or to do such other acts as said Inspector deems necessary in order to comply with the requirements of these building laws, and of such permit; if after such notice such person or owner continues such violations or fails to obey any such lawful order of the Inspector, the Inspector may revoke the permit for the work in connection with which such violation occurred, or for the occupancy of said building, before a permit revoked for the reasons before mentioned can be lawfully re-issued the entire building and building site must be made to conform to the requirements of these building laws and any work or materials applied to the building in violation thereof must be removed.

Article II.

CHIMNEYS, FLUES, STACKS, FIREPLACES

Sec. 1. Every chimney shall be built from the ground up unless corbelled from a masonry wall in which case the wall shall not be less than 12" thick and the chimney corbelled not more than 12" from the wall, and the corbelling at least 1½ times as high as it is projected, except as herein provided. When a chimney is to be cut off below, in whole or in part, it shall be wholly supported by masonry or steel construction properly

erected from the ground. No chimney shall be supported by or built upon wood except that smoke flues of terra cotta pipe where allowed may be supported on wood provided there are at least six inches of cement or other equally substantial and fireproof material between such wood support and the bottom of the terra cotta pipe.

Every chimney shall be of brick, hollow terra cotta, concrete blocks or stone laid in mortar, concrete, re-inforced concrete or other approved incombustible material, and shall have a minimum inside measurement for cottages of not less than 8 x 8 inches and for two story or more houses not less than 8" x 12".

Chimneys shall extend four feet above any flat roof and unless the roof is of incombustible or fire-resistive material shall extend at least two feet above any part of the roof covering within six feet horizontally distant, and shall be capped with cement of an average thickness of two inches, terra cotta, stone, cast iron or other approved incombustible material. If, in the opinion of the Inspector, the heights required above are not sufficient to protect adjoining buildings from fire and smoke the height shall be increased as the Inspector may determine.

All masonry chimneys except those of concrete shall be plastered on the outside surface from the basement floor to the under side of the roof boarding with cement and lime mortar at least one half inch thick or shall be laid with full flushed joints neatly struck. No corbel shall be built out from any four inch chimney wall except immediately under the roof for the purpose of enlarging the chimney on the outside in which case the inside wall shall be carried up straight, and the added thickness maintained to the top of the chimney; corbelling for this purpose shall in no case be more than the thickness of the wall corbelled from. In no case shall any corbelling be built out from any chimney for woodwork or timber to rest upon.

Sec. 2. Metal strips shall be built into every chimney at

all floor levels, secured to the surrounding joists or to the rough floor in a manner to form an efficient fire stop. Except as hereinafter provided, all floor framing shall be at least one and one half inches from the chimney, and no wood work of any kind shall be placed in, against or within one and one half inches of any chimney or be supported by, nailed, or otherwise directly secured to any chimney, except that wood mantels, floors, baseboards, or other interior finish when protected by approved asbestos at least one-eighth inch thick or other approved fire resistive material, may come into contact with the plastering covering the chimney. No woodwork of any kind shall be placed within four inches of any masonry forming the back or sides of a fireplace unless such masonry be at least four inches thicker than hereinafter required, in which case the distance shall not be less than two inches. No metal shall be driven into masonry of any chimney nor shall any gas pipes, wires or electric conduits be placed in the space between the chimney and floor framing. Every smoke pipe hole into the flue shall be provided with a metal thimble set horizontally and flush with the inside of the flue and with the outside of all masonry walls of the chimney, and no woodwork shall be within six inches of such pipe hole. Every unused thimble shall be protected with a metal cover. A cast iron frame and cleanout door shall be protected over any opening at the base of the chimney, separate flue of chimney, or ash vault below a fireplace. All chimneys which are dangerous from any cause shall be repaired and made safe, or taken down.

Sec. 3. The walls of every smoke flue shall be not less than four inches of brick or re-inforced concrete, six inches for hollow terra cotta or concrete blocks and eight inches for stone or plain concrete and the flues shall be lined, except as hereinafter provided, continuously from the bottom of the lowest thimble or top of smoke chamber to the top of the chimney with hard burned terra cotta flue lining built in as the chimney is carried up with the ends fitted closely together, provided, however, that if the walls are of brick, eight inches

thick and the joints in the inside of the flue neatly struck, or of solid re-inforced concrete, eight inches thick, the lining may be omitted. In one story buildings not over 400 square feet in area, smoke flues may be built of well burned terra cotta pipes with hubs set in cement mortar, supported and protected.

Every horizontal flue shall be made of one continuous piece of cast iron pipe, (soil pipe prohibited) extending into the chimney flush with the inside, supported and protected on the other end by brick, concrete, or other equally substantial and fireproof material at least six inches larger all around than the pipe. Such flues shall be protected thruout their entire length and circumference by bricks laid in mortar at least four inches thick; or by vitrified asbestos cement at least one and one half inches thick applied to wire netting with an inch air space between it and the pipe; or by a metal covering with four inch space between it and the pipe.

Sec. 4. Metal smoke stacks may be built entirely outside of any building. Such stacks shall be carried on separate foundations proportioned to the loads, shall be made of steel plates not less than 3/16 of an inch thickness with a spark arrestor maintained at the top, and shall be designed to resist all possible strain by the use of substantial guys or anchors or shall be of a self-supporting type approved by the Inspector. Metal smoke stacks shall not be permitted to be passed thru any combustible roof unless protected as required in Section 2 preceding. Any portion of such stacks that may be heated to a temperature exceeding 800 degrees Fahrenheit, shall be lined with fire brick.

Sec. 5. Every hearth in front of a fireplace or grate opening shall extend at least to the outside edge of the facing of the fireplace or grate opening on each end and be at least twelve inches wide in front of such facing. The masonry over every fireplace or grate opening shall be supported by substantial iron bars or masonry arches. The masonry walls at the back and sides of every fireplace grate opening shall be at least eight inches thick if of brick, and at least twelve inches thick

if of stone. If of stone, they shall be lined with at least four inches of brick work.

There shall be no woodwork around any fireplace or grate opening, within twelve inches of the same, which projects beyond a line drawn from the edge of the opening, making thirty degrees with the facing. Imitation fireplaces intended for use with gas or electricity shall be constructed thruout including the hearth of approved fireproof material not less than two inches thick.

Article III.

WOODEN CONSTRUCTION

Sec. 1. All timber sizes given are nominal sizes. Wooden buildings shall have balloon frames or types equivalent, and such frames shall have sills and corner poses not less than 4" x 4" for cottages and 4" x 6" for two story, or more, houses, plates not less than 2" x 4" and ledger boards not less than 1" x 4" and notched into studs one inch deep. Outside studs shall run in one length from sill to plate, shall be doubled at sides of openings and trussed above openings more than five feet wide in walls supporting floors. Floor beams shall be spiked to wall studs or to blocking of full width of the studs.

Buildings three stories high, shall have wall studs not less than 2 x 4 inches spaced not more than 16" center to center. Cottage and two story buildings shall have studding not more than 16 inches between centers.

Article IV.

LOT LINE RESTRICTIONS, ETC.

Sec. 1. This section applies only to buildings hereafter erected.

Residence buildings shall not be located nearer than 4 feet to the lot line nor nearer than eight feet to the next building, provided however that in any case cornices may extend two feet nearer.

The minimum distance above specified for residence buildings shall also apply to all buildings which are not used for residence purposes or as garages, except that such buildings may be placed nearer to the lot line neighboring building than the distance above specified if all the parts of the exterior walls or projections therefrom which come within the distances above specified are constructed of brick, concrete, or equally substantial and incombustible material.

Sec. 2. Party walls shall be of brick or solid concrete not less than eight inches thick, built the full thickness to the top, and properly and solidly bound together with mortar completely filling the joints.

Sec. 3. The construction of all fire walls shall be the same as for party walls.

Article V.

VENTILATION

Sec. 1. All vent pipes from toilets shall be four inch.

Article VI.

WIRING

Sec. 1. All wiring for electricity shall be what is commonly called "BX" wiring, inside the house.

Article VII

FIRE STOPS

Sec. 1. A fire-stop satisfactory to the building inspector

shall be built flush to the outside walls of the building, and between the studding on the first floor of all buildings.

Article VIII.

ROOF AND ROOF STRUCTURES

Sec. 1. All roofs and leaders therefrom shall be so arranged as not to discharge water upon a public way or adjoining property.

Every building shall be provided with such snow guards as are necessary to prevent the snow or ice thereon from falling into any travelled way.

Article IX.

FIRE PROTECTION

Sec. 1. The Inspector may order one 2½ gallon approved hand chemical fire extinguisher for each 2500 square foot of floor area or fraction thereof, if, in his opinion, the conditions of fire hazard warrant such protection against fire.

Article X.

PROTECTION DURING BUILDING

Sec. 1. No excavation shall be made in or under a street or sidewalk nor shall any barricade, scaffold, covering or other temporary structures be erected in or over a street or sidewalk during building operations, without a permit therefor. Such permit may be issued by the Superintendent of Streets, and may specify the time during which such obstruction may continue. The person making such excavation shall protect it with sheet piling if necessary or as required by the Superintendent, and shall protect all street mains, pipes and conduits to the satisfaction of the Superintendent. Any obstruction in

or over the street or sidewalk shall be guarded by the person making the same with lights at night, and in such other manner as the Selectmen or Superintendent may require. The Selectmen may require such person to file a bond with satisfactory surety to protect the Town from all liability during such work or obstruction.

Whenever any person is about to construct, alter, demolish or remove the exterior wall of a building within five feet of the line of a public street he shall cause that portion of the building bordering upon the street to be enclosed by a proper fence not less than four feet high and at least five feet from the line of such buildings; the fence shall be made as much higher as the Superintendent shall direct and it shall be maintained until all liability to accident from falling material ceases; he shall also maintain a walk not less than thirty inches wide satisfactory to the Superintendent around said fence as long as the sidewalk is obstructed and he shall maintain proper lights from sunset to sunrise if so required by the Superintendent at both ends of such enclosed space.

In erecting, altering, repairing, demolishing, or removing any building or structure no person shall leave in any public street any lumber or building material rubbish or remains of any old building for a longer period than shall in the opinion of the Superintendent be reasonably necessary under the circumstances; if allowed to remain in any street after dark the persons carrying on such operations shall cause a sufficient light or lights to be placed over or near the same and kept lighted from sunset to sunrise. All rubbish from such operations shall be removed from the streets before noon of the next secular day after it is placed there and if the person carrying on such operation fails to remove it it shall be removed by the Superintendent at the expense of such person.

Any person violating any provision of this section, of the preceeding section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

Article XI.

OCCUPANCY

Sec. 1. No building coming within the scope and purpose of the foregoing provisions shall be occupied until the Inspector has approved the same for occupancy.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Citizens of the Town of Acushnet:

A brief review of this department's year's work shows very pleasing features, i. e. The continued complete freedom from diphtheria. Every reported suspicious case has been dealt with promptly and cultures sent to Boston immediately. All were returned negative.

Our tuberculosis cases have struck a new low level so that our expenditures for hospitalization have been greatly reduced, also the appearance of any epidemic has been avoided.

This, however, cannot lead us to let down any precautionary measures or to anticipate the continuance of these conditions, so we cannot reduce our budget below the annual average of these figures.

War conditions and the letting down of garbage disposal in New Bedford has been responsible for the establishment of several swill fed piggeries in different parts of the town that call for much more supervision, yet in the face of wartime food conditions have made it unadvisable to legislate out of existence.

At present there is a smallpox epidemic coming this way from Philadelphia that may call for strong measures on the part of the Board of Health as already vaccination is being advised as a very important precaution. Also experience shows a more or less certain amount of epidemic diseases usually follow wartime conditions.

The meat situation has greatly boosted local slaughtering and gasoline and tire shortage prevents slaughtering in Brighton

or other centers. This has and will greatly increase the cost of inspection.

While this is so the fact is also true that while this greatly increases the Board of Health budget it is partly reimbursed to the town as in the past.

The Board took a cut in its salaries during the depression which have never been restored, while other departments have not only restored their reductions, but have been sharply increased, the Board feels that an increase in its salaries is only its just due and is asking for the same.

Trusting that this report will be satisfactory and with hopes for a brighter future.

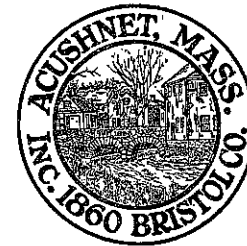

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and
Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my eleventh annual report as Superintendent of the Acushnet School System.

The year 1942 marked the first anniversary of the entrance of our country into this world war. The tremendous resources of the United States have been utilized in such a manner that a profound influence is being exerted in every theatre of conflict. A powerful transition from defensive tactics to offensive strategy is materializing among the United Nations. Every individual in this nation will be called upon to make sacrifices and forego many conveniences. I am confident that the American People will rise to the occasion in characteristic fashion. Many difficult experiences lie ahead but ultimate victory shall be ours.

At the first regular meeting of the School Committee following elections in March Arthur J. Provost of South Main Street was unanimously designated Chairman of the School Board for one year.

The resignation of Miss Louise Baldwin, teacher of Departmental English at the Parting Ways School, was accepted on March 23, 1942. On April 21, 1942 the Board elected Miss Rita O'Grady of 285 Tarkiln Hill Road, New Bedford, to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Therese C.

Charest. On the same date the Committee voted to close the upper grades classroom at the Long Plain School.

On September 3, 1942 the resignations of Mrs. Emily Sylvia, teacher of Departmental Literature at the Parting Ways School, and Uldric Meunier, driver of the school bus, were accepted. At this time the Committee voted to close the Special Class at the Mason W. Burt School there being less than ten pupils in attendance. The Board unanimously elected Omer Pineau of South Main Street to serve as permanent driver of the school bus.

It was with considerable pride that the remaining members of the School Committee noted that John L. Fawcett, a member of the Board, had accepted a Commission in the United States Navy during the month of November.

On December 4, 1942 the Committee accepted the resignation of Harry Sherman as janitor at the Long Plain School. Arthur Forand of Cushing Lane was appointed temporarily to this position.

Prior to the first week of school in September many transfers were made among members of the Teaching Staff. Upon closing the upper grades classroom at the Long Plain School Miss Anna Orłowski, then teaching this group, took over grades 4 and 5 in the same building. Pupils of the 6th, 7th and 8th grades enrolled at the Parting Ways School and were transported in the school bus. Miss Anna Zajac was transferred from grades 4 and 5 at the Long Plain School to grade 5 at the Parting Ways School.

Mrs. Verna LeBlanc, teacher of grade 5 at the Parting Ways School assumed the duties of Departmental Literature instruction in the upper grades of the same school. Mrs. Mildred Meade, teaching the Special Class at the Mason W. Burt School, took over grade 5 in this building. Miss Hester E.

Quigley was transferred from grade 5 at the Mason W. Burt School to Departmental English at the Parting Ways School. Stacia Skoczolek, teacher of grades 1 and 2 at the Burt School was transferred to grade 1 at the Parting Ways School. Miss Rita O'Grady, newly elected teacher, was assigned to grades 1 and 2 at the Mason W. Burt School.

The closing of two classrooms in the system precluded the necessity of hiring two additional teachers and reduced the staff from twenty-one members to nineteen.

Many repairs were made to buildings and heating plants during the year. Government priorities made it impossible to complete the installation of Herman-Nelson heating units at the Marie S. Howard School. As an alternative method unused indirect radiators were added to existing banks to augment the source of heat in the two classrooms involved. Matthew Niziolek and Joseph F. Resendes did an excellent job on this project during overtime hours.

A heavy wire fence was erected at the rear of the Parting Ways School to separate the playground from privately owned property. New front doors were installed at the Mason W. Burt School. Several ceilings at the Parting Ways School were whitened. A new auxiliary boiler was set up in the basement of the Long Plain School. Many worn pipe lines were renewed at the Parting Ways School and the Marie S. Howard School.

All textbooks were examined carefully and extensive replacements were made. In many instances more recently revised editions of History and Geography books were purchased. The Acushnet Teachers' Association has been most helpful in supervising changes in courses of study. A suitable course of study in elementary Science is being formulated. A course in Health Education was conducted in a very interesting manner by Miss Latimer of the State Department of Public Health.

Many valuable suggestions are being incorporated in our daily classroom routine.

Under provisions of Part 1 of Chapter 70 of the General Laws, which provides for State reimbursement on account of the employment of teachers, \$3,970.00 was due the town of Acushnet on November 20, 1942. For the tuition in our public schools of children in the custody of the Division of Child Guardianship, under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 76, sections 7 to 10 inclusive, the sum of \$587.86 was credited to this town. On account of salaries received by certified teachers of Americanization classes \$40.00 was reimbursed this community.

Foregoing reimbursements total \$4,597.86. Thus the net cost to local taxpayers for regular school purposes was \$46,402.14.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

1942

Albert F. Ford,

My dear Mr. Ford:

My fifth annual report of activities in the field of health is herewith submitted.

All children of school age were physically examined from September 16, 1942 to October 26, 1942. Defects were reported to parents. It is hoped that a greater cooperation among adults will materialize. When school authorities point the way for remedying the health status of children and parents do not respond the program becomes valueless.

Vaccination clinics were held as follows:

September 2, 1942	26
September 15, 1942	36
Number vaccinated	62

All children vaccinated were visited as a further check-up.

Chadwick Clinic skin tests were given to sixty pupils on March 31, 1942. Of this number 23 were X-rayed on April 1, 1942. Four students were given a physical examination on April 13, 1942.

From May 1st to June 1st 103 pupils were inoculated after due notification to parents.

A nutritional program was conducted at the Mason W. Burt and Marie S. Howard Schools under the able supervision of Miss Higgins of the State Department of Public Health. Excellent results were obtained.

On February 26, 1942 a follow-up program was executed for fourteen pre-school children who had previously been examined at the Well Child Conference. Mrs. Chamberlyne of the State Department interviewed school authorities on the subject of home cooperation on March 25, 1942.

A case of especial interest involved a pupil at the Mason W. Burt School whose posture was discovered to be most unusual. It was observed that ribs protruded on the right side. Hip bone was not easily discernable. Child was removed from school and parents were advised to call in a specialist. As a result child was admitted to Sol-e-mar Hospital for treatment of Curvature of the Spine. This pupil is still at the Hospital.

On October 16, 1942 cultures of throats, hands and teeth were taken on sterile swabs and transferred to Agar-Agar plates. At the suggestion of Miss Latimer of the State Department these units were loaned by the St. Luke's Hospital Clinic for demonstration purposes. The experiment was conducted in grades 6, 7 and 8 with much success.

On December 17, 1942 several 4-H Club members at the

Marie S. Howard School made up a Christmas basket and presented same to a needy case. Christmas Carols were sung by the group.

Recognition is herewith rendered the Trust Fund Commissioners for their kind cooperation in providing means of operating on two school children.

The School Department personnel has been most helpful throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To the School Committee, Superintendent, Teachers and Citizens of the town the School Physician respectfully presents the following report:

Thanks to the continuance of the immunization against diphtheria we are able to report another year of complete freedom from diphtheria and with the closest cooperation of all the school department members other contagious outbreaks have been reduced to a minimum.

The rationing due to wartime conditions that has called for the use of our school houses has been the cause of uneasiness for fear that this prolonged presence of the public in the rooms occupied by the children would introduce disease germs which would bring an epidemic that wartime conditions always occasion.

Vaccination will be more rigidly enforced the coming year in the presence of an outbreak of Small Pox in a neighboring state.

Fuel shortage in the homes also has called for alertness for any grippe or flu outbreaks.

The exceptionally good cooperation of the teachers have been rewarded by a marked improvement in the physical condition of the pupils and we feel rather proud of the communications of the State officials on these results. While the outlook is not too favorable at the present we trust that increased cooperation by the parents added to the continued alertness of the teachers, with the support of the Superintendent and the School Committee will help us through another year with continued improvement in all ways.

One Moderator for 1 year.

One Park Commissioner for 3 years.

All the above mentioned Town Officers are to be voted for on one ballot.

For this purpose the polls will be opened at each and all said precincts at 11 o'clock in the forenoon and will close at 8 o'clock in the evening at each and all of the several precincts.

You are hereby further required and directed to notify and warn the said inhabitants of the Town of Acushnet afore-said who are qualified to vote in Elections and Town affairs therein to assemble subsequently and meet in Town Meeting at the Town Hall in said Acushnet, on Saturday, the sixth (6) day of March next at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following subjects and business, viz:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to determine the compensation which each Town Officer will receive and make an appropriation therefor.
