

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Selectmen organized on March 8, 1943, and Mr. Henry L. Guilbeault was elected Chairman of the Board. Miss Mary Viera was re-appointed clerk. Board meetings are held each Monday evening at 8 o'clock in the Selectmen's Office.

POST-WAR REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Board of Selectmen have in mind the purchasing of Treasury War Bonds for the purpose of establishing a Post-War Rehabilitation Works Program. A Committee of ten members representing the various municipal departments has been organized, and their duties will be to discuss and to prepare Post-War Projects for the employment of our men and women when released from the armed forces, or war industries.

In view of the fact that the present financial condition of the town is very good, this Board is of the opinion that now is the time to plan for the future.

SALE OF TAX TITLE POSSESSIONS

During the past year the town has realized \$5,578.00 from the sale of property repossessed by the Town. This represents approximately 20% of the Tax Title Possessions Account.

ANNUAL AUDIT

This Board recommends an article to see if the town will adopt the By-Law whereby there shall be an annual audit of the Town's accounts. If this By-Law is adopted, it will not be necessary to place this article in the warrant each year. It will also facilitate the work of the State Auditors, and represent a saving to the town.

REPORT OF BUREAU OF OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

At the close of 1943 there were 77 active cases receiving Old Age Assistance.

The peak load was reached in January, and again in July and August with 89 cases being aided each of these three months.

In September all cases were reviewed to conform with the new changes in the Old Age Assistance Law, and consequently there was a steady decline.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Acushnet for the period from September 4, 1942, the date of the previous examination, to October 11, 1943, and submit the following report thereon:

The books and accounts in the town accountant's office were examined, checked, and compared with the records of the several departments in which money is collected or bills are committed for collection, and with the records of the town treasurer.

The general and appropriation accounts in the ledger were analyzed, the appropriations and transfers being compared with the town clerk's record of financial votes passed in town meeting and with the finance committee's authorizations of transfers from the reserve fund.

A trial balance was taken off proving the accounts to be in balance, and a balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on October 11, 1943, was prepared and is appended to this report. This balance sheet indicates that the financial condition of the town is very good.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book was footed throughout, the recorded receipts were compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the records of disbursements were compared with the accountant's books and the treasury warrants.

The treasurer's cash balance on October 11, 1943, was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The recorded payments on account of maturing debt and interest were checked with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the several funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the board of health were examined and listed. The income and disbursements were proved and the balances were found to be as reported.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, the redemptions were checked with the receipts as recorded on the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles on hand were listed and compared with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked. The town and district taxes outstanding according to the previous examination, and all subsequent commitments, were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's cash book, the recorded abate-

ments were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were checked, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The records of departmental accounts receivable were examined and checked in detail. The recorded payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book and the abatements were verified.

Verification of the correctness of the outstanding tax and departmental accounts was obtained by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The efficient and accurate manner in which the work of the town treasurer, collector of taxes, and the town accountant has been performed is worthy of commendation.

The records of the selectmen, town clerk, building inspector, and of the police, fire and health departments for licenses issued were examined and checked. The payments to the State were compared with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer were checked to the treasurer's cash book.

The surety bonds of the financial officials bonded for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and reconciled with the town treasurer's and the town accountant's records.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, and departmental accounts, together with tables showing the condition and transactions of the various trust funds.

While engaged in making the audit, co-operation was received from the officials of the town, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following

report for the year 1943:

Immediately following the election the newly elected

member Clement St. Amand Jr. was duly sworn into office by the Town Clerk

At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman: Joel P. Bradford, M.D., Secretary: Mrs. Louise F. Taber,

Agent and Inspector of Licenses: Clement St. Amand Jr.

Allen E. Weeks was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering and said appointment was confirmed by the State Department.

The year 1943 has ben different from other years in several ways. For the first time since the construction of the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital our town has been for the past six months without an inmate in that institution. This reduced our expenses sufficient to enable us to complet the year without a deficit.

A mild epidemic of Scarlet Fever has given the Board considerable extra work and anxiety, but the epidemic passed with no fatalities.

The great increase in slaughtering raised our inspection fes to approximately thre times the average amount, while the garbage contract had to be substantially increased in order to obtain anyone to collect the garbage.

The condition of many cesspools in the thickly settled section of the town has become such by reason of their becoming impregnable to the passage of water causing an overflow onto the surface of the ground thereby creating a menace to the health of the public. We anticipate in the not to far distance making the installation of septic tanks mandatory in all casses where land is insufcient to permit a proper disposal of the overflow of cesspools.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and

Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in the town of Acushnet.

On March 3, 1943 the School Committee convened in the office at the Parting Ways School. Arthur J. Provost and Roger Lienard, newly elected member, were in attendance. Arthur J. Provost was elected Chairman of the School Board for ensuing year. Albert F. Ford was elected Secretary to Board.

It will be recalled that John L. Fawcett, a former member, had accepted a Commission in the United States Navy in November, 1942. Until March of 1943 there were but two members of the School Committee conducting the affairs of the School Department, Arthur J. Provost and Allan L. Rawcliffe. Upon the election of Allan L. Rawcliffe as Town Clerk and Treasurer there still remained but two members of the School Board.

After due consideration of the problem involved the School Board directed Secretary on March 9, 1943 to contact the Board of Selectmen, in writing, urging that a third member of the School Committee be appointed to complete unexpired term of John L. Fawcett, said term running to March, 1945. Shortly after receipt of this request Board of Selectmen, meeting with

Town Clerk and Town Moderator, appointed Stefan S. Orlowski of Garfield Street.

On April 6, 1943 the School Committee unanimously elected the following employees:

- 1. Arthur Forand of Cushing Lane janitor at the Long Plain School.
 - 2. Anne Crosby of Taunton to Teaching Staff.

The following teachers were placed on tenure:

- 1. Frances Kinniery of the Long Plain School.
- 2. Hester E. Quigley of the Parting Ways School.

Teachers re-elected for one year were:

- 1. Avis McKeachern of the Parting Ways School.
- 2. Constance Osberg of the Marie S. Howard School.
- 3. Rita O'Grady of the Mason W. Burt School.

The resignation of Verna LeBlanc, teacher of Departmental Literature at the Parting Ways School, was accepted with regret. Mrs. LeBlanc left the profession in March, 1943 after having taught school since 1935.

On June 15, 1943 the School Board accepted the resignation of Anna M. Orlowski, Principal of the Long Plain School, effective June 18, 1943. Miss Orlowski had taught school in Acushnet for thirteen consecutive years.

The Committee unanimously elected Mrs. Mildred Meade as Principal of the Long Plain School.

Miss Jennie Maskalenko of Bridgewater was elected to the Teaching Staff.

Transfers and assignments of teachers for September, 1943 were approved as follows:

- 1. Blanche Rogers of the Marie S. Howard School was transferred to grade five at the Mason W. Burt School.
- 2. Ruth Taber of the Marie S. Howard School was transferred to grades five and six in the same building.
- 3. Constance Osberg of the Marie S. Howard School was transferred to the Parting Ways School to teach Departmental Literature in grades six, seven and eight.
- 4. Anne Crosby of Taunton was assigned to grades three and four at the Marie S. Howard School.
- 5. Jennie Maskalenko of Bridgewater was assigned to grades one and two at the Marie S. Howard School.

On September 14, 1943 the Committee designated Miss Ruth Taber as Acting Principal of the Marie S. Howard School to serve during the absence of Miss Susie J. Davis, Principal of the School.

On November 23, 1943 the resignation of Miss Avis Mc-Keachern, teacher of grade four at the Parting Ways School, was accepted same to become effective on December 17, 1943.

In spite of many changes among the teaching staffs of all schools the system, as a whole, is operating smoothly. It is to be observed that the teachers are co-operating in the War Effort with wholehearted enthusiasm and vigor. The children of Acushnet have purchased many thousands of dollars worth of War

Savings Stamps and Bonds. It is clearly the intent of the school pupils to do their part in speeding the prosecution of this war.

It must not be forgotten that the primary objective in any classroom should be to afford a maximum educational opportunity to all pupils housed therein. In this connection there should be close harmony between parents and teachers.

The stress and strain among members of any family during wartime is terrific. A great part of this tension is carried over into the classroom. Each teacher, in turn, must assume a great responsibility in maintaining an effective discipline and fostering right habits among his pupils. A large number of children are experiencing more freedom from parental control than ever before. In many instances both father and mother work in Defense Plants during different shifts. Having little or no supervision outside of school hours many children run wild and become social delinquents.

We grant that all grown people have an ever present obligation to contribute to ultimate victory for the United States and her Allies but there still exists the obligation of properly caring for the youth of this country. An appeal to the parents and guardians of local children to try to recognize the dangers of these circumstances is herewith made. If you have sons and daughters attending school be reasonably certain that a responsible person is left in charge at your home while you are working. Make it a point to require your children to go to bed early and to eat the right kind of food. Constantly remind them to be careful of their conduct and to be polite to their elders.

We certainly owe much of a moral and religious nature to the citizens of tomorrow. When this world conflict ceases let it not be said that we have won abroad and lost at home. We must take care of our children at all costs and make every sacrifice to protect their future. May I once again urge that there be a close association between parents and teachers in order to properly provide a wholesome training for our young people:

The Acushnet Teachers' Association has been productively active in checking text books used in the local schools. During the year new Science and Health books have been adopted. Selection was made only after prolonged examination of available materials. It is anticipated that above installations will have been completed by the end of 1944. The profession of teaching is an endeavor requiring the exercise of great skill and perseverance. Utmost tact must be used in handling children in any grade. Lessons must be prepared in such a manner as to hold the interest of the pupils at the same time paving the way for obtaining concrete results. With this thought in mind the Association created panels for discussion of common problems confronting teachers working in the same grades in all schools.

Teachers of grades one and two gathered periodically and exchanged ideas. So it was with other teachers in grades three and four, five and six, seven and eight. This building of a common understanding of the needs of children in any community is constructive and provides a basis for securing excellent results. At the end of the school year it is a source of satisfaction to note that the majority of one's class has achieved to a maximum degree that which was set up as the year's objective.

Extensive repair work was done in all schools during 1943. Many ceilings were scraped and whitened. New sinks and bubblers were installed at the Marie S. Howard School. The south cellar wall at the Mason W. Burt School was waterproofed. Much damage had been done to supporting floor timbers. Brick piers were erected to shore up weakened sections. Heating pipes at the Parting Ways School were covered with asbestos. Several window frames and sash were renewed. An auxiliary line was run from the boiler to the Report Center to provide heat at this point without necessity of first covering entire building. In order to keep up wooden school buildings there is an ever present

need for constant repairs. The School Department is indeed fortunate in having four janitors of the calibre and initiative of Matthew Niziolek, Edward P. Lyons, Joseph F. Resendes and Arthur Forand. These men have contributed unstintingly of their outside time in order to complete many repair projects.

Under the provisions of Part 1, Chapter 70 of the General Laws, which provides for State reimbursement on account of the employment of teachers, \$3,740.00 was due Acushnet on November 20, 1943. For the tuition in our public schools of children in the custody of the Division of Child Guardianship, under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 76, sections 7 to 10 inclusive, the sum of \$508.68 was credited this town. On account of salaries received by certified teachers of Americanization classes \$50.00 was reimbursed.

Above reimbursements total \$4,295.68. Net cost to local taxpayers for regular school purposes \$46,704.32.

The Trust Fund Commission materially aided the cause of education in this community by approving bills for the purchase of school books in sum of \$159.05.

The Teaching Staff has been doing its utmost to preserve the right type of educational procedure. It is my personal hope that the local system may continue to benefit from the integrity and thoughtfulness of each classroom teacher.

The School Committee and townspeople of Acushnet have been most friendly and understanding. It is my thought, in closing, that the people of Acushnet are determined that their children shall be given every opportunity to secure a good education.

All children of school age were physically examined during September and October.

State Board of Health co-operated by loaning Audiometer equipment for testing hearing of local children. Number of school pupils tested follows:

Hearing is tested in grades three through eight. Results are recorded on health cards. Parents are notified of children having defective hearing. It is hoped that all parents are cooperating by endeavoring to correct cases of hearing loss.

New State Vision Testing equipment was used to test eyesight of all school children in April, 1943. Parents were notified in cases where poor vision existed.

Equipment was again used in November, 1943. Among 134 tested there were 20 retests. Those below normal numbered 37. Those wearing glasses numbered 8.

Toxoid treatment notices were sent to parents on May 18, 1943. Inoculations were begun on May 24, 1943. Those receiving treatment follow:

An unusual number of cases of Scarlet Fever were reported in February, 1943.

There is a State Law which clearly indicates that school children having Pediculosis (lice in hair) must be sent home. Parents refusing to co-operate in correcting such a condition may be brought in on neglect charges.

On January 4, 1943 one child was examined at the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital at Attleboro. X-rays proved negatives.

Many children were found to have ringworm and impetigo. On May 14, 1943 three boys were taken to the Fairhaven High School for Chadwick Clinic follow-up examinations.

When it is definitely pointed out that defects exist among children it is immediately mandate upon parents to correct these conditions as soon as possible. Time and effort are wasted if results are unsatisfactory. Many pupils show poor progress in school because parents do not take care of cases reported to them. Parents should constantly urge their children to clean their teeth and to keep themselves bodily clean and neat.

School officials and teachers have been very helpful during 1943 and much satisfactory progress has been made. It is very pleasant to work with people who are so earnest in doing their utmost for the young people of Acushnet.




