#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1948:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member Dr. Joel P. Bradford, was duly sworn into office by the Town Clerk.

At our first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman-Joel P. Bradford, M.D.

Secretary-Mrs. Louise F. Taber

Agent and Inspector of Licenses—Clement St. Amand, Jr.

Allen E. Weeks was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering which appointment was confirmed by the State Department.

We are thankful that another year has passed without a serious outbreak of contagious diseases and especially having had no case of diptheria.

The school inspections have shown our greatest need among the children to be dental work in the schools. We are therefore asking an additional \$500.00 to allow us to care for our most needy cases.

The attention of the Board of Health was drawn to the prevalence of rats in the town by an unprovoked attack by a rat upon a child in an open field with quite serious results, which causes us to wish for some united action to rid the town of the presence of these rats. In some communities this has been accomplished by property owners dispensing prepared bait at regular intervals. Thanking everyone for their co-operation we present the following statistical report:

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 1948

To the School Committee and Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my seventeenth consecutive annual report.

Equality of responsibility for the general welfare, each according to his capacity, in peace and in war, always has been a part of the American tradition. A sense of justice requires nothing less than real acceptance of the resulting ideal of equal opportunity. This ideal of equal opportunity to satisfy one's personal needs and to share in the work of improving conditions under which men live lies at the very heart of democracy. We accept this ideal and talk about it, but we have never approached its full realization.

On far flung battle fronts men by the millions recently faced death and many actually gave their lives believing that their country would do a better job in the future, that a way would be found to give their children, their younger brothers and sisters and all other children an equal opportunity and a fair start in life.

The plain fact is that the common-sense American way to meet this responsibility is for the federal government to help the states finance their educational programs and at the same time leave the control of the schools entirely with the states and local communities.

It is of especial significance to the Town of Acushnet that on June 17, 1948 the state legislature passed a school aid bill (Chapter 643) which promotes the equalization of educational opportunity in public schools of the Commonwealth and the equalization of the burden of the cost of schools to the respective towns.

In 1948 State reimbursements to Acushnet totalled \$6,118.23.

In 1949 State receipts on account of the functioning of the local schools will exceed \$34,000.00.

In other words about \$28,000.00 more will be credited to Acushnet in November, 1949 than in the previous year. Obviously this large increase in State receipts will more than offset added requirements for school support and will, in a large sense, limit the taxes levied in 1949 for the operation of all the municipal departments.

When State Income Taxes are paid by residents of this Commonwealth, money thus realized is distributed to all the cities and towns and the assessors use these funds for the purpose of reducing the tax rate.

May I herewith explain the formula for distributing income tax monies as it applies in Acushnet. Incidentally it is a 50% formula.

Property valuation (not assessed valuation) in Acushnet was pegged in 1946 by the General Court under Chapter 559 at \$3,750,180.00. This figure holds for five years thru 1950 (for purpose apportioning state and county taxes). Analysis produced a floor figure of \$6.00 per thousand in the formula. A minimum cost per pupil for school support of \$130.00 was established for all residents 7 to 15 years of age, inclusive, as of October, 1948. We have 655 such residents qualifying. This product less the \$6.00 per thousand property valuation figure produces the full formula net.

Formula figures are outlined below: \$85,150.00 (Product 655 x \$130.00) 22,507.08 (Product 6 x \$3,751.18)

<sup>\$62,642.92 (</sup>One-half this figure will be reimbursed to Acushnet)

Hence, on November 20, 1949, \$31,321.46 will be made available to Acushnet from the income tax distribution.

Transportation reimbursements are also paid from state income tax funds.

Transportation expenses in excess of \$5.00 per pupil in the net average membership are paid by the state as a refund to the town.

The state pays for the education of all state wards.

To illustrate more clearly that a substantial increase in state reimbursements will be had by the local town treasurer the following comparisons are tabulated:

Just as the state pays one-half the cost of Vocational education, in 1949 the state will reimburse Acushnet about 40% of the total estimated cost of school support, as outlined in the 1949 estimated school budget.

It is of interest to note that a new bill (Senate 130) has been filed with the State legislature seeking \$25,000,000 more to be used to create a greater equalization of educational opportunity on the state-wide basis.

On December 6, 1948, the School Committee convened at the Parting Ways School and voted as follows:

- 1.-Voted \$88,000.00 for schools in 1949.
- 2.-Voted \$14,500.00 for Vocational education in 1949.

The 1949 estimate for schools is \$13,500.00 more than was made available by town appropriations in 1948. Specifically \$72,500.00 and \$2,000.00 or a total of \$74,500.00 was appropriated in 1948.

Of this \$13,500.00 increase these added sums are allocated as follows:

Of primary importance is the inclusion of added sums for teachers and other school employees. School Committees in New Bedford, Dartmouth, Fairhaven and other neighboring communities have voted salaries for teachers averaging \$3,150.00. Currently, Acushnet teachers receive \$2,470.00 annually. The Acushnet School Committee plans to adjust wages in 1949 to a point nearer prevailing levels in this area.

The boiler at the Parting Ways School is 26 years old and has served its usefullness. To replace this boiler and to make necessary changes in the heating system more funds will be required in the repair account.

Provision has been made for increased tuition costs as well as for price increases for books, supplies and maintenance items.

The net cost to taxpayers for school support in 1948 was \$68,380.58.

Estimated net cost in 1949 for school support is \$53,550.00.

A total of \$12,500.00 was made available for Vocational education in 1948. \$11,000.00 was appropriated and \$1,500.00 was transferred at the end of the year.

Reimbursements received by the Town Treasurer for Vocational Education totalled \$5,037.29.

The net cost for this type of education to local taxpayers in 1948 was \$5,962.71.

During the year, three teachers resigned and one teacher was transferred from the Marie S. Howard to the Parting Ways School. As to names and dates may I refer you to the listing of the 1948 teaching staff. In order to hold qualified teachers within the school system it becomes increasingly evident that a genuine effort should be made to pay wages commensurate with those in communities which are likely to try to secure members of our teaching staff to augment their own.

I would appreciate having more parents and interested citizens visit the schools and make inquiries as to the procedure and the type of educational material being made available to the children. Your visit would not only prove of value to you personally but would serve as an inspiration to that teacher with whom you came in contact.

Much inside painting and varnishing was completed in all school buildings during the year. The largest project undertaken was that of furnishing and installing insulated siding on the Parting Ways School. The whole building could not be completed because funds were not available. The Committee requested \$4,000.00 to do the required work but was granted one-half this sum or \$2,000.00. Three sides of the school were finished. New gutters were installed on each of these sides and outside trim was painted one coat.

This project should be completed during 1949.

All fire escapes need leading and painting.

Everything considered, the school buildings which are now occupied should be kept in good repair. It is good business, under existing circumstances, to preserve our schools and keep them in good shape for as many years as possible. The school population is definitely growing larger and facilities will be taxed more and more during the next six years in order to house children of elementary age. It is good sense to keep in mind that the Long Plain School may have to be re-opened in the event classes become too large for the remaining buildings to house.

In October, 1948, the water service to the Parting Ways School became unusable. New pipes were installed and the volume thus supplied adequately took care of needs. This project was completed for a little over \$300.00.

With such funds as are made available, new textbooks are being purchased to replace worn-out units. Careful study of new editions precedes selection of replacements. The books now in use are well adapted and compare favorably in subject matter to those in neighboring school systems.

The Trust Fund Commission approved a supplemental purchase of books in the sum of \$154.03. This assistance is appreciated by both the children and school personnel.

It is a pleasure to recognize the consistent application of the teachers and school principals. We have a good teaching staff, which is not only loyal to this community but enjoys 100% membership in the State Teachers' Federation and the National Education Association.

The Acushnet Teachers' Association was also the second in the state to support the Massachusetts Council for Schools with 100% membership.

The School Custodians and Bus Driver contribute much to the smooth operation of all schools. Their efforts are appreciated. The School Committee and townspeople have been helpful in the ever present obligation which we all have in our common effort to produce well-trained and courteous citizens.

The strength of any community rests upon its ability to support and maintain an effective system of public education.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 20, 1949

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

At the end of another fiscal year the School Physician and Nurse submit their annual report.

At the opening of schools as we began physical examinations we were greatly pleased at an improved condition both in posture physical defects. Especially we note the fact that a very large percentage of children in the upper grades have had diseased tonsils and adenoids removed and teeth are kept cleaner than in previous years. Our greatest improvement is apparent in the advanced grades which encourages us to believe that our work of previous years is showing results. We still hope that sometime in the future we may be able to afford at least a part-time phyical director.

For another successive year diptheria immunizations have been given and no cases have been reported in the town.

September through December, 1948—491 pupils were examined. The following indicates the departures from normal health of these children:

The predominating feature of these examinations was the large number of pupils who require dental attention of some type. A school dentist is urgently needed to cope with this situation.

State eye examinations were given in May and June. 313 pupils tested, 29 retested and 17 failed. All pupils who failed the eye examination were taken to Dr. Merton Wainer of New Bedford for more complete examinations. The pupils who have failed the doctor's examination will receive a notice from the doctor.

State Audiometer test was given to 380 pupils. Of this number there were 9 failures. Notices were sent to the parents, and also the State Health Department. 3 pupils were receiving treatment and 2 received corrections.

We appreciate most heartily the complete co-operation of the Parents, School Committee, Superintendent, and Teachers.


