REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith, our report for the year ending December 31, 1963.

At the initial meeting of the Board of Selectmen following the Town Meeting re-organization of the board took place. At this time Clement St. Amand, Jr. was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred C. Fortin was re-appointed Clerk.

The Board met every Monday evening as in the past years at 7:00 P.M. in their offices at the Town Hall, to hear petitioners and to carry out the various duties connected with their respective offices. In addition to this it was quite frequently necessary to hold special meetings when the need arose.

The annual audit of the town was conducted. However, it was found that the financial status of the town leaves much to be desired. After entering the new year with excess funds in excess of \$80,000.00 accounting adjustments deleted some \$30,000.00 from the books meaning that our Free Cash for 1964 were some \$20,000.00 less than in the preceding year. Such a condition inevitably points to a tax increase for this coming year.

The Board this year was somewhat chagrined to find that lack of engineers in the State Department of Public Works has stalled the continuation of the reconstruction of Middle Road. All of this was not overlooked by Representative McLean who worked hard and long to no avail. Funds are still being carried,

however, and additional funds will be asked this year to add to the Reconstruction Account. It appears a certainty at this time that an early start will be made this year on this project, extending northerly a considerable distance.

The new year also saw the resurfacing of Jean, River and Farewell Streets with a permanent type Bituminous Concrete. This is in keeping with our long range program of street improvements of a more lasting nature. In this same vein, Leonard Street was also resurfaced in part, and plans this year call for its completion. Curbing and sidewalk surfacing along Main Street by the State has also made for some improvement in this area. This year also calls for similar work along these lines, along with the resurfacing of Darling and Ludlow Streets, if the Town Meeting is willing.

Town sponsored Student Government Day was again observed in 1963 and our teenagers in Public and Parochial Schools were afforded the opportunity of a bit of insight regarding the functioning of a town government.

Plans seeking aid and assistance on a State and Federal level for water front development along the Acushnet River have developed and seem fairly apparent to gain favorable support from the proper aiding agencies. It is hoped that such development will insure in-town salt water access to the Bay and the open waters for small boats. Such is the plan along this line.

The town this year was faced with the reoccurring problem of the appointment of a School Building Committee, formulated for the purposes of adding to the present Junior High School on Middle Road. Plans this year call for funds for final plans and drawings, construction to start shortly thereafter. All of this points up a definite need for concentrated fiscal planning. We could well find ourselves in a precarious position if care is not exercised along financial lines.

Plans are in the offering for the appointment of a Sewage Survey Commission, who it is expected will be assigned the duties of the exploration and investigation with the Town of Fairhaven and the City of New Bedford as to the feasibility of a Regional Sewage Disposal Project, which is considered by many one of the biggest area problems today.

Many other projects and noteworthy accomplishments could herein be noted; however, the Board in concluding this, its annual report, wishes to thank each and every resident of Acushnet for the efforts, support and encouragement which they have given to the Board in trying to achieve our mutual goal: "BETTER TOWN GOVERNMENT".

The Board acknowledges also, the co-operation and assistance of the various town departments and boards. It is always gratifying to see that most departments make every effort to operate within their respective budgets.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Acushnet for the period from January 1, 1962, the date of the previous examination, to November 11, 1963, and report thereon as follows:

An examination and verification was made of the financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection.

An analysis was made of the town accountant's ledgers for the period covered by the audit. The receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and the payments were compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's record of town meeting proceedings, and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee.

The necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on November 11, 1963.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash book footings were verified, and the cash balance on November 11, 1963 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank in which town funds are deposited.

The payments made on account of maturing debt and interest were compared with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file. The outstanding coupons were listed and reconciled with the balance in the coupon account as shown by a statement furnished by the depository.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the board of health were examined and listed. The income was proved and all expenditures or transfers to the town were checked in detail.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and listed. The amounts transferred to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records and the reported redemptions were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts. The tax title transactions were further verified by comparison with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The taxes and excise outstanding at the time of the previous examination, and all subsequent commitments, were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the taxes transferred to the tax title account were proved, and the outstanding

accounts were listed and proved with the respective controlling accounts in the general ledger.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked. The commitments were proved, the collections were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts, the abatements were verified by comparison with the records in the departments authorized to grant them, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective controlling accounts in the general ledger.

The outstanding tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses and of receipts from miscellaneous charges, as well as the records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, were examined and checked in detail, the payments to the town treasurer and to the State being verified.

The records of receipts of the sealer of weights and measures, and of the health, school and library departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, the reported payments to the treasurer being checked with the treasurer's cash book and with the town accountant's records.

The surety bonds of the town officials required to file such surety for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and

water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit cooperation was received from the several town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1963

Acushnet, Mass.

The Bristol County Mosquito Control Project has been at work in Acushnet for nearly five years having embarked on a program of permanent mosquito control in the Spring of 1959. The year 1963 has seen continued progress toward the reduction of the mosquito problem within the town.

Because of the comparatively open winter, the project crew assigned to Acushnet was able to perform its duties with but few interruptions due to inclement weather. A total of 126 acres of breeding plots were treated by application of insecticide dust to the ice surface.

Oil and insecticide were employed during early spring to exterminate the young larvae wherever found before they could emerge as biting adults and take to the wing. This application forms a film on the surface of the water which kills through asphyxiation and contact.

During the summer the project spray truck applied a residual insecticide to the foliage in sections of the town where the heaviest mosquito population persisted. Whenever notified in advance, this project sprayed for outdoor public activities. Playground and recreational areas were treated weekly. Requests from property owners were answered promptly.

The most effective method of mosquito control is the elimination of standing water in which the mosquitoes breed.

During the past year 5,595 feet of brooks and streams in Acushnet have been cleared of debris. The brush has been cleared from the banks along 4600 feet of these streams. Many acres of standing water have thus been drained and will not produce mosquitoes another season.

The periodic treatment of all catch basins or storm sewers is one of many services provided by the Project in helping to reduce the mosquito population.

This Project continues to work closely with the State Pesticide Board. All personnel are fully aware of the potential hazards which could result from the promiscuous use of pesticides and have been schooled in their proper formulation and application.

We thank the people of Acushnet for their continued cooperation and look forward to another year of progress in 1964.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1963:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Sylvano Frates, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman: Mr. Emile R. Houle Secretary: Mr. Sylvano Frates

Agent and Inspector of Licenses: Joseph H. LePage

During the past year we had one patient at the Norfolk County Tuberculosis Hospital. We anticipate that this patient will be hospitalized at least one more year. There were four premature births reported, three of these were stillborns.

Dental Clinic was conducted throughout the school year with 25 clinics held. A total charge of \$1,647.00 for the clinics with \$371.00 credited for payment by the children, leaving the net cost to the Board of Health of \$1,276.00. There were 64 examinations; 265 fillings; 53 extractions; 1 X-ray; 57 prophylasis; and 209 treatments.

During December 1963, the Board of Health and the Bristol County Health Association sponsored a Heaf Testing Program for a control group. A total of 361 children took advantage of the program. Of this amount there were 5 children

who had a positive reaction. All positive reactors and their families will be asked to obtain chest X-rays. The X-ray Mobile Unit was in Town on May 15, 1963, and 777 persons were X-rayed. The Mobile Unit was here courtesy of the Bristol County Health Association. Through this program there were 78 Food Handlers Certificates issued.

Sabin oral polio vaccine was offered to all who wanted it. A total of 2311 doses were given. There were 501 doses of Flu vaccine administered. Both of these programs were offered to adults at a nominal fee, and a total of \$546.43 was collected during these programs. The Board feels that this was an excellent response to these programs, and plans to continue offering these services in the coming year.

The Board of Health still sponsors the Well Baby Clinic, which is held the first Wednesday of every month at the Russell Memorial Library.

The total number of deaths reported in the Town of Acushnet was 31.

A total of 48 Septic Tank permits were issued during the year.

The Board appointed Mr. Armand Dandurand as Plumbing Inspector, and Mr. Roland Lavimoniere as Deputy Inspector. Plumbing regulations were adopted and published in the Standard Times.

Mrs. May A. Collins was appointed clerk of the Board.

Stables regulations were drawn up and published in the Standard Times, and licenses are now being isued to all stables.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 24, 1964

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We respectfully submit for your consideration our report of data concerning our activities during the year 1963.

A School Health examination was conducted on all children who were entering the first grade. Physical examinations were also given to all students in Grades 4, 6 and 9; and to all aspirants for the Baseball and Basketball teams. 482 physical examinations were completed, which revealed the following conditions:

Notices were sent to 105 parents and 95 referrals were completed.

The Massachusetts Vision Test was given to 1202 children in the School system and 116 of these were found to have a vision problem. Notices were sent to the parents and 95 are now under care for these conditions. We wish to thank the Acushnet Instructive Nursing Association for the gift of a new Vision Testing Machine. This was a pleasure to use and helped greatly in increasing the effectiveness of the testing.

The Massachusetts Pure Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1182 pupils. 49 children were found to have hearing defects and their parents were notified, and 49 were seen by their doctor.

The Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was offered to a control group in the Town Schools with 361 pupils taking advantage of this test. A total of 5 positive reactors were found. All positive reactors and their families will be notified and asked to have chest X-rays.

Monthly Clinic held at the Russell Memorial Library at 2 P.M. on the first Wednesday of each month. At the clinics we:

- a. Attended to 198 children.
- b. Gave 46 Vaccinations against Small Pox.
- c. Inoculated 93 children against Diphtheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus.
- d. Inoculated 10 children with Salk Vaccine for Anterior Poliomyelitis.

Extra Clinics were held and 2149 adults were given Oral Polio Vaccine. All school children were offered Type II Oral Vaccine in March of 1963. Influenza Vaccine was given to 501 persons during the year.

It has been a pleasure to perform these duties, and we feel

that much has been accomplished during this past year. We have enjoyed immensely the co-operation and comradeship of the Students, the Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent and Teachers, and Co-workers, and especially to the Board of Health whose financial backing has made some of these immunization programs possible.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

1963 has been a remarkable year for the Acushnet Planning Board.

A town-wide growth plan of land-use, of streets and highways, of community facilities and of utilities, has been prepared and discussed in its preliminary form with the Selectmen, representatives of major industries, and with the Building Inspector.

Subdivision Regulations were prepared and were adopted by the Planning Board in February, 1963. Subdivision Control by the Planning Board was made effective by lodging copies of the votes and of the regulations with the Bristol County Registry of Deeds at New Bedford and with the Massachusetts Land Court at Boston.

The professionally staffed town planning program for Acushnet, administered by the Massachusetts Department of Commerce, Planning Division, under Sec. 701 of Title VII of the (U. S.) Housing Act of 1954, as amended, is scheduled to terminate in May, 1964. The scope of this work comprises:

- 1. Inventory Surveys
 - a. Base Map
 - b. Land Use Study and Map
 - c. Population Study
 - d. Economic Base Study
- 2. Community Facilities Studies and Plan
 - a. Schools
 - b. Recreation

- c. Other Public Land and Buildings
- 3. Circulation Study and Plan
- 4. Utilities Study and Plan
- 5. Area of Influence Study
- 6. Future Land Use Study and Plan
- 7. Zoning By-Law
- 8. Subdivision Regulations
- 9. Capital Budget Study
- 10. General Plan Report
- Preparation and Completion of Graphics, reports, and memoranda.

During 1963, the Planning Board membership has changed by two resignations, in addition to the annual termination of one membership.

During Calendar 1963, the Acushnet Planning Board held 24 regular meetings and 12 special meetings. The Board met frequently with the Selectmen and with a representative of the consulting planners, Atwood & Blackwell, Inc. of Boston. Several proposed Subdivisions or of other divisions of land in Acushnet were brought before the Board. Twelve were endorsed or approved by the Board.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONERS 1963

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

The annual report of the Board of Park Commissioners, together with reports on youth activities, and the playgrounds under the control of the Board, is herewith presented in accordance with provisions of law, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963.

The Board held 17 regular meetings and 5 special meetings during the year. We organized in March, and elected Edmund A. Richard as its chairman, and welcomed August R. Cote back to start his second term on the Board.

We awarded a bid to the lowest bidder, the American Playground Equipment Company, for the playground equipment installed at the park this summer, their bid was \$843.00. Also, 100 feet of chain link fence was added to the existing fence along Addy Drive, by Ornamental Iron Works, at a cost of \$139.00.

The park now has a spray pool for the youngsters, and it will be open as many hours a week as possible, depending on the work load of the maintenance man at the park. He will act as supervisor when the pool is in operation. This pool has no water accumulation. Water comes out of nozzles in a fine, soft spray, and there is no danger of anyone drowning. The effect is the same as if one were standing in a shower, and just as refreshing. The youngsters should enjoy the pool, and

also save a long trip out of town to some crowded beach. Parents are urged to accompany their children, and when chow time comes, make use of our picnic area, completely shaded, and there are plenty of tables to go around.

As usual, the baseball fields were in constant use. Many organized leagues, such as the CYO, Little League, Pony League, Colt League, and Junior High School, made use of our well-kept infields. The outfields are in rough shape, but it will be a while before they can be resurfaced, due to the high cost of such a project.

The Midget Football League has made good use of the park during the fall months, and enthusiasm for this sport runs high. You can see a couple of football games most any Saturday morning, and we feel sure that you will enjoy watching the youngsters. Don't worry about the cold, the excitement will keep you warm.

The new equipment at Kiddy-Land has certainly won over the younger set. We found this playground equipment in much more use than we had anticipated. This has pleased us, and we are planning a few more rides to add to the ones now at the park.

There is one matter that has been plaguing us for the last few years at the park, and it gets more serious each year. The problem is vandalism. The damage that a few boys cause each season costs the taxpayers needless dollars. The only way that we can think of to keep this senseless destruction to a minimum, is to have the support of all of you who use the facilities at the park. If any person sees property being wilfully damaged, we would appreciate it if you would report it to us.

In conclusion, we would like to remind you that there are many facilities available at the park for you, and urge all of you to use them.

Attending Special Class at DeValles School

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — 1963

The annual report submitted here is the thirty-second in a consecutive series released by the writer.

Beginning on January 7, 1963 and ending on December 30, 1963 the School Committee conducted eighteen meetings in the Junior High School.

Robert E. Honohan was welcomed to membership on March 5, 1963. William Fawcett was designed Chairman of the Board for the ensuing year.

A persisting growth in enrollment continued to challenge the School Committee. A sharp increase in the number of sixth grade pupils in the Parting Ways School was experienced when classes resumed in September, 1963. See the Age and Grade Distribution chart for particulars. At this time it became necessary to establish four sixth grades in the Parting Ways School. The Massachusetts Department of Education further ruled that a Special Class must be organized in the Junior High School. This class was in fact set up in the Music Room at the Junior High School with Mrs. Laura Rogers in charge.

Enrollment pressures in the Junior High School became immediately noticeable.

In review, article 14 of the March 9, 1963 annual town meeting was approved and did in fact make available the sum of

\$1600 for the drawing of preliminary plans for an addition to the Junior High School plant. Ultimately and as a direct result of a considerable effort by the local School Building Committee, the following letter was addressed to Mr. Walter E. Owen, Chairman of said Committee, under date of December 18, 1963:

Dear Mr. Owen:

I am writing to indicate approval of preliminary plans for the proposed addition to the Junior High School in Acushnet, as filed in this office on November 5, 1963 by I. T. Almy.

When a complete set of final plans and specifications has been filed with us, your next step is to schedule a conference with us to discuss them.

To expedite the drawing of final plans and the fabricating of suitable specifications, the following article will appear in the warrant for the annual town meeting to be held on March 7, 1964:

"To see if the town will vote to provide the sum of \$10,000 to engage the services of an architect for purposes of preparing final working drawings and specifications for the construction of a new addition to the Acushnet Junior High School, said appropriation to be expended in conjunction with the sum of \$1600 previously made available under article 14 of the March

9, 1963 annual town meeting and under the control of the local School Building Committee appointed under article 14 of the July 26, 1962 Special Town Meeting"

As to a possible special town meeting to act upon school construction bids, if authorized by the town, the following comments are made:

- 1. In the event of an affirmative vote authorizing final plans, it would take approximately six months to complete said plans together with comprehensive specifications. This would project a study of said plans by officials of the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission into September, 1964.
- 2. Upon receipt of written approval from said Commission an ad for bids would appear in the press for a period of three weeks.
- 3. After firm bids from General Contractors were actually in hand, the local School Building Committee would have an additional thirty days to act.
- 4. A Special Town Meeting would then be called to authorize the local Building Committee to award a contract and to provide the necessary funds to complete said project.
- 5. Any local authorization to borrow money for a school project must be sanctioned by the membership of the Massachusetts Emergency Finance Commission at the State House in Boston.

The foregoing emphasis upon procedure does indeed point up the fact that time is of the essence. It is noteworthy that the Junior High School will be seriously crowded as early as the first day of school on September 7, 1964.

To offset this anticipated condition at the Junior High

School, the School Committee has voted unanimously to add two instructors to the staff, effective on September 7, 1964.

With obvious implications to the public, the local school system is gradually expanding into a set of circumstances in which four classrooms will be needed at each grade level instead of the existing three rooms to a level.

Repairs to Physical Plant

In the public interest, it is vital to maintain public buildings in good repair. At the Junior High School the drainage system was augmented. A new freezer unit was installed in the walk-in refrigerator. Several tons of stone dust were applied to the baseball diamond. With the passing of time wear and tear will manifest itself at the Junior High School and many replacements will become warranted. Much exterior painting of the trim will be required in 1964.

Work at the Long Plain School included the installation of a new cement step to the rear of the building. A new water pump was installed and the furnaces were repaired. Much inside painting was completed and repairs were made to the roof and exterior trim.

A new basement ceiling was furnished in the Parting Ways School. New fire bricks were installed in the boiler. Much inside painting was completed and a chain link fence was erected on the playground bordering Grant Street.

Extensive repairs were completed on the outside trim at the Mason W. Burt School. Two new front doors were installed here. Repairs were made to the boiler and a new smoke stack was furnished.

Much inside painting was completed at the Marie S. How-

ard School and a temporary stone fill was provided to the south of the building. The School Committee contemplates much additional work among all the schools in 1964.

It is of no small consequence that Vocational tuition rate for day people was raised from \$400 per student per year by \$25 per person, effective January 1, 1964.

Your attention is directed to the noteworthy increase in estimated receipts for 1964 which should, in some measure, offset the added school budget requirement.

The high participation in the Junior High School lunch program continues. During the school year ending in June, 1963 the number of meals served reached 43,139. Gross receipts were tallied at \$18,252.06. The opening cash balance in September, 1963 was \$1,904.27. Inventory on hand on the opening day of school was valued at \$261.22.

The efforts of all teachers and non-teaching personnel to contribute to a constructive school experience for the youth of this town are recognized here. The community is growing. With a noticeable increase in the number of residents, it follows that many more services must be supplied.

The scope and complexity of school administration is pronounced as we enter calendar 1964. The School Committee membership continues to carry its responsibilities with determination and vigor.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

The past year was a busy one for the library staff and trustees. The number of students using the library's research material continues on the increase. To that end, the major book and periodical expenditure during the year was used to supplement and augment this section. Because of our fast changing world, new works need constantly to be added in order to keep pace — particularly in the science and allied fields.

The much needed index card filing cabinet was purchased. This new file allows for better cross-indexing and for future expansion. Rather than build a portable storm entrance, it was decided to install an overhead heater over the main door. This is proving very satisfactory in added comfort and more even heat in the main reading room. It is practical because it is used only when necessary.

A project long contemplated has been the work of restoring the paintings by Clement Swift which Mrs. Swift donated years ago. While in storage, one of the extra large paintings was badly damaged by rusty water. Both extra large paintings were coated with a heavy oil and soot film when the old heating system backfired. Since the library paintings form the major art works of the town, the trustees have long felt they should be restored as soon as possible and preserved for the future. We are happy to report that this work was begun during 1963, and we hope to continue this project during 1964.

The Town's observance of Massachusetts Art Week during the last full week in May, sponsored by the Board of Trustees, continues to be very successful. The opportunity to show creative work has become an incentive for many in our town, and each year sees new painters and craftsmen joining in this event. This weeklong exhibit has attracted viewers from other communities, and comments have been most favorable on the scope of the exhibition.

Various one-man shows were put on during the year. An innovation has been the display of varied art work from the Acushnet Junior High School students when no one-man show was scheduled. These should encourage our young people to greater effort.

Our library staff again put on the very popular Story Hour during the summer months. The last story hour featured motion pictures which were a hit with the youngsters. The program of book certificate awards for reading continues, as does the service inaugurated a year ago of placing book collections in the various classrooms.

The librarian's statistical report shows we received a total of 107 books during the year. Again we wish to thank the donors, and also those who continue to supplement our periodicals with their donations.

After several years of not mentioning this subject, it again becomes necessary to do so. We refer to the damage done to the trees, shrubs, and lawn of the library by thoughtless children who persist in using this area as a playground. It is costly to keep repairing and replacing, when a little cooperation on the part of the parents and the children would eliminate this continuing headache to the trustees. Will you

kindly check with your children, and if they play in this area, make it "OFF LIMITS" to them? You'll be doing yourself and your fellow townspeople a favor.

For your information, library hours are: Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 2:00 to 5:00 P.M., Thursday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 P.M.
