Report of the Board of Selectmen

The election of April saw the addition of James S. Madruga, Jr. as our new Selectman. He is a former Assessor of several years, therefore has previous town experience. The annual reorganization was held and John Sylvia was elected Chairman. Natalio "Nate" Gomes retired after serving one (1) term.

The year 1978 again was very busy in many areas. We held the annual Town Meeting with 78 Articles overall and most have been carried out as required.

Also, there were 5 Special Town Meetings held, comprising 27 Articles and these mandates have also been carried out to our best ability.

The Solid Waste issue on a regional basis with New Bedford, Dartmouth, Fairhaven is still unresolved due to various complications, but our Contract with the present operator does not expire until 1980.

As you know, we voted sewerage funding and presently we have an application pending before the State and Federal governments.

Revenue Sharing continues and the Town Meeting voted to utilize these funds to pay our debt. Unfortunately Antirecession Funds were deleted nationally as of September, but those funds previously received were utilized wisely by vote of Town Meeting.

We continue to participate in the CETA Program, placing many of our unemployed townspeople to work and also teaching them various skills and accomplishing great benefits to the town in general. Also, this is a rehabilitative program. The Town of Acushnet has taken every advantage in this program and over the past 5 years our CETA payrolls, including the summer youth program have exceeded 1 million dollars, which we are proud of.

Appointments to various town, county and district boards have been made throughout the year and we have attended meetings of other boards in the interest of improving your town.

We continue to contact Representative MacLean, Congressman Studds in behalf of our citizenry and as usual they are most cooperative. The water improvements of a new main along Wing Road, Noyer Street, Hathaway Road and the cement lining project in Central Village of town were completed, thus a great improvement in water for the consumer in addition to better fire protection.

Again we participated with neighboring communities for Collective Purchasing, also with the School Department, and it is hopeful this program can be expanded as time goes along, which should result in substantial savings to our taxpayers.

We continue our pledge for the improvement of the town, also bearing in mind the cost to the taxpayers.

Report of the Police Department

To the Officers and residents of the Town of Acushnet, I hereby, submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1978. During the past year the members of the Police Department attended various training programs. Two patrolmen received promotions to the position of Sergeant and eight new part-time police officers were appointed.

Receiving promotions to Sergeant were Officer Barry W. Monte on June 12, 1978 and Officer Stephen J. Cassidy, Jr. on August 14, 1978.

All officers trained as Emergency Medical Technicians attended refresher courses at various locations in the surrounding area some of which were given by Olde Colony Chapter Massachusetts Association EMT Inc. re-certifying them as required by state law.

Officer Normand H. Soucy was appointed to the plainclothes division on January 31, 1978 and is presently working in that capacity as Detective Patrolman.

Basic Cardiac Life Support Instructors Sergeant Barry W. Monte and Officer Gil Marques, Jr. conducted two courses in CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation). These courses being attended by Officers of the department as well as members of various town departments.

On November 13, 1978 Officer Mary Ann Antonietta entered the Police Training Academy held at New Bedford to attend and complete twelve weeks of training and thus comply with Chapter 241 of the Acts of 1974.

Eight new part-time police officers were appointed to the department. Appointed on August 7, 1978 were: Officers Eliot A. Spooner, III; Francis L. Kasmire, Stephen McCann, and Douglas P. Rodgers. However, Officer Rodgers resigned from the department on October 27, 1978 for personal reasons.

Appointed on November 13, 1978 were: Officers Gilbert J. Harrison, Denis A. Tetreault, Steven J. Carrier, and Elaine J. Edwards.

During the course of the year new equipment was obtained. The department purchased a new electric typewriter (FACIT); a police cruiser — 1978 Ford LTD; and an inkless fingerprinting system from DACTEK International Inc.

The Board acted upon numerous plans throughout the year. Special meetings were held as needed.

The increase in lot sizes to a minimum of 150' frontage and having not less than 30,000 square feet was passed at the June 19, 1978 Special Town Meeting and approved by the Attorney General on October 16, 1978.

The new Rate of Development law which pertains to subdivisions was also approved by the Attorney General on October 16, 1978.

The Board welcomed a new member, Robert E. Francis who was elected to replace Mr. Roland Benoit. Mr. Benoit retired this year after serving on the Board for nineteen years.

We are presently working with the local regional planning agency, Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District to update the Subdivision Rules and Regulations.

We presented an article at the Special Town Meeting of October 16, 1978 to bring the Town's Protective By Laws in compliance with the Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A as amended by Chapter 808 Acts of 1975. This article was not acted upon for the meeting was adjourned because of the lack of a quorum. It will be represented at the Annual Town Meeting of April 2, 1979.

This way problems are identified before the spraying takes place. Well over 30 requests were taken care of throughout the town. A continuation of this program is anticipated in July 1979.

HEALTH CARE PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

Under the capable and efficient supervision of Katherine H. Church, R.N. along with the splendid services of Dr. William A. Jeffrey and a dedicated staff of Nurses we have been able to carry out a program of Health Care to the benefit of all our Townspeople. Our sincerest thanks to all.

NURSING SERVICES

The contract with St. Luke's Hospital of New Bedford for Homemaker-Health Aid Services was renewed. This contract is under the capable supervision of Mrs. Elaine Tripp, R.N.M.S. of St. Luke's Hospital. We were also certified as a member of the Massachusetts Association of Community Health and approved as a Provider of Health Services. SENIOR CITIZENS HEALTH COUNSELING: Held the Third Tuesday of each month — appointments are to be made through the Council on Aging Office Tel. 995-8528. During the year nine clinics were held and 109 attended.

FLU CLINIC

A Flu Clinic was held in November and 338 innoculations were administered.

HEARING CLINIC

On October 26, 1978 the Mobile Screening Unit of the Boston Guild for the Hard of Hearing conducted a program for testing. This program was sponsored by the Acushnet Council on Aging; the Acushnet Board of Health and the Greater Acushnet Business and Professional Womens Club. 42 persons were tested. Of these 21 failed and were referred for follow-up. The Public Health Nurses have visited these persons to advise and ensure appointments are made with an Otologist.

Our meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at headquarters in the Parting Ways Building. The office is open Monday through Friday from 9:30 A.M. to 1:30 P.M. to render services and information relating to the problems of the elderly.

The Drop-In Center is open until 5 P.M. Monday through Friday. An agerage of 80 meals are served daily through the Nutritional Hot Lunch program. This past year 26,116 meals were served at the site and 2,983 were delivered to homes of persons who are physically unable to come to the site. Card tables are in play every afternoon. There is dancing on Monday, Tuesday and Friday afternoon, and bowling on Thursdays.

During the year the Council appointed Irene Girard to serve on the committee to represent the Acushnet Council on Aging at the Regional Elderly Nutrition program. Abel Plaud and Alice Tatro were authorized as representatives to the Board of Directors of Coastline Elderly Services, and Olivine Frost was approved as a member of the Advisory Board Area Agency on Aging.

The Board of Health staff provides a counciling clinic in the Council on Aging office from 1 to 4 P.M. on the third Tuesday of each month.

The members of the Council wish to extend their thanks and appreciation to the volunteers who participated in the Elderly Nutritional program and to the Board of Selectmen for their assistance throughout the year.

The Acushnet Historical Commission had an active year, high-lighted by the reenactment of the Battle of the Bridge and the pillaging of the town. On the 200th anniversary of the battle, Acushnet joined Fairhaven and New Bedford in this three-day reenactment. The Battle at River's End was the highlight of the event. The Commission would like to thank Mr. Donald Bernard of Fairhaven and his committee for the great effort they put into making this a success.

The Long Plain Museum had a decided increase in the number of visitors this year. We have one of the most extensive displays in Massachusetts of clothing from the late 19th century, but we are looking for more manikins to display them properly. The flagpole has been lowered for repairing and painting, and several new cases have been made for exhibits.

The furnace in the Museum was repaired at a cost of \$427.30 instead of installing a new one which would have cost approximately \$3,000. Because of this saving, the Commission requested at a town meeting the funds to install storm windows to further reduce the oil bill.

We have had little success in researching the many old buildings in town and are now checking with Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development to see if they can help us with this project.

Report of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project ANNUAL REPORT — ACUSHNET, MASS. DECEMBER 31, 1978

On June 30, 1979 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty years of service to the Town of Acushnet and nineteen other communities in the county.

The Project again experienced another heavily infested mosquito season. Our ditching program was impeded as all trucks were pressed into service with mist blowers and ultra-low volume sprayers. Two of our trucks were also pressed into service on Saturdays.

The Project also intends to add two more ultra-low volume sprayers during the coming mosquito season.

Despite the increase of the mosquito population, out of the four equine encephalitis cases reported in the county, only one case was confirmed.

The blizzard of February 6th added to the heavy infestation of mosquitos, as the snow melted, creating innumerable breeding areas that could not be reached for larviciding.

We finally began our larviciding program in April and 29% acres were treated before our sprayers were mounted on May 22nd.

The spraying season terminated on September 19th and our brook and ditch maintenance program got underway. This resulted in the reclamation of 905 feet of existing waterways and the removal of 80 feet of brush.

We thank the residents of Acushnet for their continued cooperation.

Report of the Acushnet CETA Department

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Acushnet CETA Department has had as many as twenty-seven (27) full-time participants in various town departments under the Title II and VI Programs, with a payroll of approximately \$182,076.66 plus fringe benefits.

During the year the town also took advantage of three(3) Title VI B Projects, two (2) being utilized by the School Department, the other by the Acushnet Board of Selectmen. These projects employed forty-one (41) participants and met a payroll of approximately \$199,388.00 plus fringe benefits.

We also participated in the CETA Youth Programs, Y.W.E. having ten (10) youths working ten (10) hours weekly after school, and increasing to approximately sixty-three (63) youths in the summer program working twenty-eight (28) hours weekly. The Y.E.T.P. Program has three participants working thirty-five (35) hours per week. They must also attend night school while on this program. The Youth Payroll was approximately \$45,831.20 plus fringe benefits for the year.

The above programs have twofold objectives, first, it assists the town, allowing many labor oriented jobs to be completed with the extra manpower, secondly, it also helps participants to learn while working and create responsibilities, and good sound work habits.

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to transfer the sum of \$8,000. from Veterans Benefits Department, Expense Account to the Highway Salaries Account.

ARTICLE 3. Unanimously voted to accept 86 acres of land, more or less, recorded in Bristol County, S.D., Registry of Deeds in Book 988, Pg. 125, willed to the Town by Miss Betsey W. Taber, to be kept in its natural state and held as a Wildlife Sanctuary and be in the exclusive control of the Acushnet Conservation Commission.

Motion made and passed to strike out Section 3.2 (a) and Section 3.2 (b) of the Town Protective By-Laws, and insert in place thereof: No dwelling shall hereafter be erected on any new lot containing less than 30,000 square feet and having a frontage of less than 150 feet. (2/3 vote required.) 180 Yes. 32 No.

ARTICLE 2. Unanimously voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chap. 44, Sec. 4, and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year.

ARTICLE 3. Unanimously voted to authorize the members of the Cemetery Board to perform work in the Cemeteries and to determine the compensation to be paid to said members.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to utilize the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds received or to be received to pay Debt payment in part, utilizing the amount of \$193,737.62.

ARTICLE 5. It was voted to appropriate \$10,000.00 from Taxation for the purpose of contributing a Stabilization Fund in accordance with the provisions of Gen. Laws, Chap. 40, Section 5B.

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to amend Article 6 of the April 1977 Annual Town Meeting regarding Old Colony Regional Voct. School Committee membership by inserting as follows: "All ap-

pointments to the Committee to be made by any member town and the filling of any vacancies shall be made by an appointing committee; consisting of three (3) members of the Board of Selectmen, three (3) members of the local School Committee, and the Town Moderator, who shall be the Chairperson. The Board of Selectmen and the local School Committee shall designate the members of their respective boards who will serve on the appointing committee."

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to raise by taxation the sum of \$5,500., and the sum of \$5,500. be transferred from the E & D Account for the purpose of purchasing two (2) new police cruiser Cars.

ARTICLE 8. It was voted to raise by taxation the sum of \$311.04 to compensate Leo Cusson, 221 Hathaway Road, Acushnet, for damages caused to his truck due to alleged poor road condition of Hamlin Street.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to transfer from the Anti-Recession funds, Act P.L. 94-369 of 1976 the sum of \$12,000. for the purpose of lighting and pertinent improvements at Pope Park.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to transfer from Federal Public Works Employ. Act of 1976, Title II Anti-Recession Funds the sum of \$3,000. for the purpose of waterproofing Town Hall, and also for chimney repairs at the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 11. Unanimously voted against raising a sum of money for the purpose of engaging a Dog Officer on a full time basis and supplying pertinent equipment.

ARTICLE 12. It was voted to transfer from the E & D Account the sum of \$3,875. for the purpose of installing a gas tank and necessary pertinent appurtenances at the Highway Department garage.

ARTICLE 13. Motion failed to pass to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money for additional street lighting.

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to table article 14, requesting \$8,405. of Town funds in the Treasury to be used in conjunction with and in addition to any funds allotted by the Commonwealth for the constructing, reconstructing and improvements of town roads. Unanimous. (2/3 vote)

It was voted to table Article 22, — requesting that the Town adopt the following by-law: There shall be a Capital Program Committee consisting of five (5) registered voters, all of whom shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen and who shall be appointed for terms of four (4) years each, except for the term of the first appointments.

ARTICLE 23. Unanimously voted that the Town appropriate by bonding the sum of \$80,000. for the purpose of this Article which is for the purpose of improving its water system, to be paid out of water revenue. (2/3rd vote unanimous.)

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to transfer the sum of \$4,667. received from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration to the 1978 Snow Removal Account.

- ARTICLE 2. It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account, the sum of \$5,000., for the purpose of installing drainage pipe on Anthony Street from #15 easterly a distance of 900 feet.
- ARTICLE 3. It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account, the sum of \$17,000., for the purpose of purchasing a dump truck for the Highway Dept.
- ARTICLE 4. It was unanimously voted to postpone the acceptance of MIDDLEWOOD DRIVE from Middle Road westerly to present terminus 700 feet, more or less, as per plan on file in Town Clerk's office, plan of Arthur C. Thompson, Inc., Engineers and Surveyors, Marion Mass. dated Sept. 3, 1976 until next annual Town Meeting, to let it go through another winter and see how drainage is being taken care of.
- ARTICLE 5. Unanimously voted to accept from the Trustees of the Tabor Cemetery the ownership of said Tabor Cemetery as well as all recorded deeds of lots, and monies which are now in their hands and same shall be placed under the control of the Cemetery Board of the Town of Acushnet.
- ARTICLE 6 It was voted not to compensate Richard Lapre the sum of \$94.00 for damage caused to his car due to alleged poor road condition of Saucier Street. 49 Yes. 66 No.
- ARTICLE 7. It was voted to transfer (from available funds) the sum of \$420. from the E&D Account to pay our portion of the amount owed to Domingos Batista for work performed at the dam on Leonard Street.
- ARTICLE 8. Unanimously voted to transfer from E&D Account the sum of \$441. for Memorial Day purposes to pay the amount owed for Memorial Day Parade. (9/10th vote C.44,S.64 Unanimous)
- ARTICLE 9. (Article amended to read REPAIR.) It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account the sum of \$2,000. to repair the heating system at the Long Plain School Museum.
- ARTICLE 10. Motion failed to pass authorizing the Town Accountant to employ a part time clerk in his office.
- ARTICLE 11. It was voted to table Article 11, regarding the following by-law: "Before the issuance of a septic permit or a building permit, the applicant must request and receive a wetlands determination from the Conservation Commission. The cri-

teria for determining wet-lands will be the conditions described in G.L., Chapter 131, Section 40, the wet-lands protection law. This determination must be issued by the Acushnet Conservation Commission and returned within 10 days after receipt of the request and is appealable to the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering."

Articles 12, 13 and 14 not acted on due to lack of quorum. Hands were counted. 93 people were present. Motion was made to postpone acting on the three articles until the Annual Town Meeting, on October 23, when a quorum failed to be present. Adjourned the meeting at 9:40 P.M. on October 16, 1978.

Special Town Meeting December 11, 1978

Meeting was called by warrant of the Selectmen, John Sylvia, Chairman, Frederick L. Duguay, Jr., James S. Madruga, Jr. dated November 27, 1978 and dully posted by the constable, Joseph Francis, as directed by the selectmen on Nov. 27, 1978.

At 8:02 P.M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, with a quorum present.

The following business was transacted:

ARTICLE 1. It was voted to appropriate by borrowing the sum of \$70,000. for the construction of improvements to its water system, including the lining of water mains. (This article was voted on at the Annual Town Meeting Article 23. Had to be voted on again in order to get the loan, due to the wrong wording in accepting vote at the Annual Town Meeting.) 2/3 vote required. 94 Yes. 12 No.

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to transfer from the E & D Account the sum of \$6,464. for the purpose of paying a debt concerning Public Building insurance, only after an amendment to the article was made as follows: "That no more than \$6,464. be transfered, and that the bill not be paid for at least 45 days, until the Selectmen, Town Acct. and Treasurer have met to clarify this charge with the Insurance Company. A report must be made at the next Town Meeting as to how it was resolved."

ARTICLE 3. Motion failed to pass transferring the sum of \$43.25 to compensate Dorothy Misiaszek, 8 Birch Street, for damage caused to her car, due to alleged poor road condition at corner of Pine and Birch Streets.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to transfer the sum of \$980. from the E&D Account for the purpose of effecting improvements to the Long Plain Museum.

ARTICLE 5. Unanimously voted to transfer the sum of \$10,000. from the E&D Account representing the non-Federal local share of the eligible costs and an additional sum of money representing the ineligible costs to be used together with State and Federal assistance to engage a consulting engineer to prepare a comprehensive wastewater facilities plan, said sums to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

The meeting adjourned at 9:04 P.M.
