There are many others who deserve credit for their endeavor to be in the foregoing list.

In the opinion of your Committee, the several schools have made commendable advancement the past year, considering the amount of attendance, by reason of inclement weather, sickness, distance and other causes. It would be well for parents and scholars to more fully realize the importance of prompt and regular attendance at school, and also the more hearty cooperation with and support of the teachers in approved methods of teaching, conducting and disciplining their schools, for we must not forget that the boys and girls of today are to be the men and women of the near future.

We regret the apparently growing tendency exhibited by parents for their children to use text books of too high a grade for their attainments, for in mental as in physical action, a child must creep before it walks.

We deemed it expedient to substitute the Franklin arithmetics and Worcester spellers for those in use in the schools, a course which proves to have been judicious and gives general satisfaction both to teachers and pupils.

We would suggest that as a matter of economy, if for no other reason, it behooves all that they give the subject of

popular education their earnest attention and support to the end that all may become intelligent citizens, filling places of usefulness and trust, and not come up illiterate criminals, to be supported in almshouses and penal institutions.
