#### REPORT

OF THE

## SCHOOL COMMITTEE

### Of the Town of Acushnet

FOR THE YEAR 1882-83.

According to the usual custom, your Committee would again submit their annual report.

At the organization of the board Thomas E. Braley was elected Chairman and Caleb Slade, Secretary.

The special superintendence of the schools was assigned as follows, viz.: The Long Plain and Bog to T. E. Braley, the Wheldon and Perry Hill to Caleb Slade, and the Village Grammar and Village Primary to Perez S. Doty.

As we look back over the past year, and consider the grade of our schools, the changes of teachers to which we are subject, and other circumstances under which we are placed, we feel assured in saying that, upon the whole, our schools have made their usual progress, and their present condition in general compares very favorably with that of schools in adjoining towns.

Considerable praise is due to nearly all of our teachers for the special efforts they have manifested for the improvement of their particular schools.

In consequence of the size of the school at Long Plain, and the large number of primary scholars attending the winter term, we considered it for the interest of the school to supply an assistant teacher, and although it incurred extra expense, we feel well repaid for the expenditure.

Better results might have been gained, and the teacher's work been more agreeable to them, had they occupied separate rooms with their classes.

In closing, we would suggest that we consider it usually for the best interest of a school that the government and method of instruction be left as far as possible to the discretion of the teacher and committee.
