TOWN OF ACUSHNET.

Bristol 88.

To Sylvester Pratt, Constable of the Town of Acushnet.

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Acushnet qualified by law to vote for town officers to meet at their town house in Acushnet Village, on Monday, March second, A. D. eighteen hundred and ninety-one, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz.:

ARTICLE 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting

ARTICLE 2d. To choose necessary town officers for the ensuing year: Town Clerk, Treasurer and Collector of Taxes, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, two School Committees (one for two years and one for three years), one Road Commissioner (for three years), Surveyors of Lumber, Constables, Health Committee, Field Drivers, Pound Keepers, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary town officers, all to be voted for on one ballot, and the polls may be closed at one o'clock.

ARTICLE 3d. To see if the town will appoint their Treasurer Collector of Taxes.

ARTICLE 4th. To determine what compensation the town will allow their Treasurer and Collector.

ARTICLE 5th. What abatement shall be allowed for the prompt payment of Taxes.

ARTICLE 6th. At what time shall the collection of said Taxes be completed.

ARTICLE 7th. To see what action the town will take in relation to charging interest on all Taxes not paid at the time specified for the completion of said collection of Taxes.

ARTICLE 8th. To see what rate of interest shall be charged from the time specified until the payment thereof.

ARTICLE 9th. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the town charges for the ensuing year: First, for the support of schools; Second, for the support of poor; Third, for the repairs of highways and bridges; Fourth, for incidenial expenses.

ARTICLE 10th. To see if the town will authorize their Selectmen to hire money if necessary.

ARTICLE 11th. Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town: Yes or No ballot, and no other.

ARTICLE 12th. To see if the town will accept a list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 13th. To see if the town will instruct their Selectmen to appoint Measurers of Wood and Bark.

ARTICLE 14th. To see if the town will accept the provisions of Chap. 58 of the Public Statutes, whereby the Selectmen may appoint an Inspector of Provisions.

ARTICLE 15th. To see what action the town will take in regard to Acushnet's proportion of the tax to be levied on the new bridge across the Acushnet river.

ARTICLE 16. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing the road near Tripp's Mills, there having been a complaint made about said road.

And you are required to serve this warrant by posting five

copies thereof, as the town by its vote has directed, one at the Post Office, at Acushnet Village, one at the Post Office at Long Plain, one at the store of Charles M. Morse, Jr., one at the shop of James E. Chamberlain, and one at the shop of Luther H. Reynolds, seven days before the time of said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of said meeting.
