Notice was received early in the season, from the cattle commissioners, that one inspection would suffice for 1895, and that must be made late in the Fall, after all animals were in from pasture. In accordance with this order, I waited until about the first of December, and had nearly finished the town, having visited about 100 farms, inspecting between three and four hundred neat cattle, beside other animals, when an order was received to proceed no further until another appropriation was made, the present one having been exhausted. I found the neat cattle in a healthy condition, and could detect no signs of tuberculosis in town during this inspection.
