REPORT OF CATTLE INSPECTOR

For the Year 1899.

Late in the summer, after concluding that there was nothing required of your inspector, came orders from the State Board to make a very thorough inspection of *all* cattle and barns where cattle are kept in the town, taking measurements of each, and distances from where cattle were watered, and a list of 29 questions was sent to be answered in regard to every place where an animal was found; and all to be done and a report sent to them before the 15th of November. The inspection of horses being included, I have killed two affected with glanders. I have found but one case of tuberculosis, and killed that cow immediately, thus preventing by a thorough disinfection of the premises, as ordered by the State Board, any spread of the disease. I have inspected and measured 128 barns, and found them mostly in a very good condition, and the cattle in much better shape than I expected, or have done in former years.

ACUSHNET FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

Within the past year there has been an increased interest in our Public Library and its branches. From April 1, 1899, to March 12, 1900, there have been given out from the three rooms 1,895 volumes, also a number of magazines. As our fund for the purchase of books is very limited, it gives us pleasure to record donations to our libraries. Mrs. Clement Swift and Miss Emma Cochran kindly gave us a good many books, the latter adding magazines. Mrs. Joseph Ricketson, 2d, of New Bedford, kindly remembered us with a donation of about 50 valuable volumes from the library of her deceased husband.

Last summer a large, handsomely bound volume was presented our Library by Sanford H. Dudley, Attorney-at-Law, in Boston. This was the "Life of Thomas Dudley, Second Governor of Massachusetts." Being a descendant of this governor of colonial fame, Mr. Dudley wrote he presented the book "as a token of good will toward the town" with "kindly remembrance of some of the town's people living and departed." All these gifts, and the interest and thoughtfulness that prompted the donors, are fully appreciated by the patrons of the libraries and by the Trustees, and they may be valuable also as an inspiration to others to "go and do likewise." We have sometimes received magazines and one or two books from friends. All favors gratefully accepted. Last fall we received from the Millicent Library, Fairhaven, 100 books, partly worn, and recently about fifty (50) more. These are a great help to us.

A larger, pleasanter place for our main library at Acushnet seems necessary to all concerned. What we really need is a *new Town Hall*, where the business of the town could be conducted more easily and comfortably; where the archives of the town could be kept with safety and dignity; where a warm convenient room for books and space for a reading table would tempt more of our citizens to visit the Library; and where a modern hall, suitable for lectures and entertainments, would meet a long felt want. We wish some of our public

spirited citizens would consider this suggestion, agitate it and then act upon it.

Your Trustees are glad to report a smaller deficit than before, and an addition of several valuable volumes new from the publishers. We earnestly appeal to the generosity of our town, both for donations of books and the appropriation of the "dog fund," which a majority of the towns in our state *allow for the support of Free Public Libraries.*

For the past three years there has been a gradual improvement in attendance, the record of each year having been better than that of the preceding year.

The attendance for the past year would have shown a very marked improvement over previous years if there had not been several special causes for absence, such as whooping cough in the Primary school, scarlet fever in the Primary, Grammar and Whelden schools, and an unusual number of severe storms during last winter, when it was very difficult for pupils at a distance to get to school.

The improvement in attendance at the Perry Hill school is worthy of special mention. During the past term the absence in that school has amounted to only 4%, as against 17 2-5% for the corresponding term one year ago.

REPAIRS.

Besides numerous minor repairs, the Perry Hill and Whelden schoolhouses have been painted, and new stoves have been purchased for the Whelden and Long Plain schools.

The stoves in the Perry Hill and Bisbee schools are in very poor condition, and should be replaced before another winter.

GRADING OF THE SCHOOLS.

The district school, to do effective work, must not only be graded, but must be directed and systematized with some definite plan and purpose in view, thereby blending the work of successive terms and teachers, so that it shall form a carefully planned preparation for future study, otherwise the work of each teacher, often not at all in harmony with that of her predecessor, is likely to form a separate element in a haphazard course.

The work of the schools for the past two or three years has been directed with a view to the careful grading of all the schools, and the establishment in all of them of a course of study which shall prepare pupils for High School work. It was found to be impossible to closely grade the schools at once, without injury to many pupils, because without a definite course to follow they had been guided in many cases by their inclinations, and had spent an undue portion of their time and efforts

upon favorite subjects, to the neglect of others equally important.

It would not have been wise to have had the pupils drop entirely, even for a short time, the study of those subjects in which they were in advance of the grade to which they belonged. Therefore the aim has been in each class to spend more time upon and to emphasize the work in those subjects in which the pupils in that particular class were most deficient, and to gradually bring the schools to a more and more closely graded condition where all pupils, in the same grade, without regard to which school they attend, may do uniform work.

An effort has also been made to reduce as far as practicable the number of classes in each school, in order that the recitation periods may be lengthened, and an opportunity given for more effective teaching.

It is better both for the individual pupils and the school as a whole, that the teacher should give a little extra attention for a short time to one or more pupils who may be a little behind their class, if this will enable them to go on, rather than that a new class shall be formed, and so diminish the length of all recitation periods; for the greatest disadvantage under which the district school labors is the large number of classes and short recitation periods.

The following table may be of interest to some, as it shows the present number of classes in each school, and the number of pupils in each class, as well as the grade to which they belong:

Irregular attendance has interfered somewhat with the work and some pupils on account of absence may have to go into the next lower class at the end of the year.

DIPLOMAS.

As the town does not maintain a High School, it has been thought best to give Grammar School diplomas, and last June the Committee gave diplomas to six pupils who had completed the course and passed a satisfactory examination.

EXHIBITION OF SCHOOL WORK.

There will be an exhibition of school work about the middle of next term. It is not proposed to have the pupils spend a large amount of time in the preparation of papers especially for exhibition, but rather to select the best of the daily work. Every set of papers to be complete, that is, representing the work of every member of the class.

Some work from every pupil in town will be collected and arranged for inspection during one or more days at each of the schools, at which time it is hoped that as many as possible of the parents will accept the invitation to visit the school and see, as far as it can be shown upon paper, what the pupils of the various schools are doing.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the zeal and faithfulness of the teachers, the continued confidence and support of the committee, and the co-operation of the parents.
