I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Acushnet for the period from October 27, 1946 to December 13, 1947, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Acushnet for the period from October 27, 1946, the date of the previous audit, to December 13, 1947, the following report being submitted thereon:

An examination and verification was made of the recorded financial transactions of the town as shown on the books of the departments receiving or disbursing money or committing bills for collection.

The town accountant's ledger was analyzed, the receipts were checked with the treasurer's books, while the payments were compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting proceedings and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee.

A trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on December 13, 1947. This balance sheet indicates that the town is in excellent financial condition.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on December 13, 1947 was proved by actual count of cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank in which town funds are deposited.

The payments made for maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The transactions of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the board of health were verified, and the securities and savings bank books representing the investment of these funds were personally examined and listed.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts transferred to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, while the tax titles redeemed were checked with the treasurer's cash book. The records of tax possessions were examined and listed, the additions as a result of tax title foreclosures being proved and the sales being compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts. The tax title and tax possession transactions were further verified by comparison with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The commitments were verified and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The cash books were footed and the recorded collections were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts. The abatements, as recorded, were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked. The payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The financial accounts of the town clerk were examined and checked. The recorded receipts from dog and sporting licenses were checked with the record of licenses issued. The payments to the town treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified, and the cash on hand on December 13, 1947 was proved by actual count.

The surety bonds furnished by officials bonded for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The financial records of the Board of Selectmen and the Sealer of Weights and Measurer, of the police, library, and cemetery departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts and with the accountant's ledger.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report ttables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and water accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the various trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit, co-operation was extended by the various town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 1947

To the School Committee and Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my sixteenth consecutive annual report.

As in the routine of family life the cost of living and meeting ordinary obligations rose sharply during 1947 so, too, the cost of public education increased in direct proportion.

In a review of experiences had during any calendar year it is usual to stress finance and the economic structure. I should like to report at great length on pupil progress and educational procedure but financial problems are so preponderantly in the foreground that I am compelled to dwell to a great degree upon the costs of operation. Such a resume precludes rendering a detailed description of instruction techniques.

On December 9, 1947 the School Committee convened at the Parting Ways School and voted as follows:

- 1. Voted to request \$72,500.00 for Schools in 1948.
- 2. Voted to request \$13,000.00 for Vocational education in 1948.
- 3. Voted to request the Selectmen to include a special article in the 1948 Warrant for the annual March Town Meeting seeking \$4,000.00 to repair the outside walls and eaves of the Parting Ways School.

Hence the School Committee is requesting \$76,500.00 for the local schools in 1948.

The over all cost of operation of the local schools increased about 10% during the last six months of 1947. The closing of one school building largely offset this increase. Had there been no consolidation, school costs

would easily have exceeded \$80,000.00 in 1948. May I point out the main factors contributing to the growth of the school budget.

Outside of a tremendous increase in the price of basic supplies and study materials the New Bedford School Committee fixed the tuition rate for non-resident secondary school students at \$175.00 per year. This rate is 17% more than the former assessment of \$150.00 per pupil.

Run of the mine soft coal is used in all school boilers. The price of coal has increased 17%. Much more fuel is being consumed due to the severity of the current winter season.

As to salaries of school personnel we are trying to maintain a workable relationship between the cost of living at any given time and wages paid.

It is reasonably certain that transportation costs will continue to rise. Upkeep of the local school bus is higher. There is some discussion about a possible increase in rates at the Union Street Railway Company.

Many more pupils were enrolled in grade one last fall. A sharp increase in the birth rate during the last six years will make itself felt for some time to come. For this reason the Long Plain School is being kept intact. In the event that school facilities prove inadequate to house all pupils it will be necessary to use this school. It would, indeed, be a grave mistake to dispose of this building in the face of a rising school population. New construction is out of the question during times such as these. I know, from personal observation, that many towns have been erecting new grammar schools and have been unable to complete the work due to excessive costs. To cite one revealing case the town of Weston appropriated \$800,000.00 to build an elementary school. To complete the project it is now necessary to seek an added \$300,000.00. It is obvious

that this is no time to consider new housing for educational purposes. Hence, it is mandate upon us to carefully maintain our present buildings and to keep them in good repair.

Recently the State Building Inspector condemned the Marie S. Howard School auditorium to the use of the pupils in attendance until a new ceiling was installed. This project was satisfactorily completed and new lighting fixtures were attached at a total cost of \$900.00

As to Vocational High School education I received a letter under date December 11, 1947 from the State Division from which I quote. "This is to advise you that on the basis of changed costs in the administration of the following schools the tuition rates for non-resident pupils in attendance upon said schools were revised to amounts indicated to date from January 1, 1948.

New Bedford Vocational School\$200.00New Bedford Household Arts School\$200.00

The above information is sent you in order that you may check the charges made by the schools."

This recently fixed rate of tuition is 25% above the former figure of \$160.00. In consequence the tuition obligation for 1948 will be at least \$2,000.00 more than in 1947 and perhaps may exceed the estimate of \$10,200.00.

Transportation costs will be greater largely due to an increase in the number of boys attending the Bristol County Agricultural School. Five boys go to this school from Acushnet as against two last year.

Reimbursements had for this type of education totalled \$4,340.65. Acushnet was credited with \$3,341.25 on tuition payments and \$999.40 for transportation.

The net cost to local taxpayers for Vocational Education was \$6,259.35 in 1947.

Under Part 1, Chapter 70 providing for reimbursement on teachers' salaries \$3,850.00 was credited this town in 1947. For the tuition of State Wards \$513.50 was realized locally. Under Chapter 71, section 7A and referred to as Chapter 679 by the 1947 Legislature the sum of \$1,179.48 was reimbursed.

In view of the fact that reimbursement was had under Chapter 71, Section 7A for the first time, an explanation as to procedure follows:

The State Treasurer shall annually pay to the town such sums approved by the commissioner of education which exceed five dollars per annum per pupil in the net average membership provided, (a) that no transportation reimbursement shall be made on account of any pupil who resides less than one and one-half miles from the school which he attends, measured by a commonly travelled route; and (b) that the amount of grant per pupil for transportation to private schools in towns which furnish such transportation shall not exceed the amount of grant per pupil for transportation to public schools. There shall be allocated from the proceeds of the tax on incomes all such necessary funds.

Above reimbursements totalled \$5,542.98.

The net cost to the local taxpayers for public school purposes was \$6,457.02 during 1947.

Reimbursements on account of education totalled \$9,883.63 in 1947. So many townspeople have inquired as to the disposition of these sums that I feel some comment should be made. None of this money may be used by any of the local Town Departments. These funds are credited to what is called the Excess and Deficiency Account. At this time over \$50,000.00 is in this account. This sum coupled with Government Bonds valued at around \$48,000.00 means that Acushnet is in a very sound financial condition. Outside of these funds there is approximately \$100,000 in free cash which is used to meet the obligations of the town in the operation of its several municipal departments.

During the year all school flag poles were lowered and repaired. A large number of window sash at the Parting Ways School were rebuilt, repainted and refitted. The return pipe line and water feed to the boiler in this school were renewed. A new oak floor was installed and finished in the grade five classroom at the Parting Ways School.

New insulated siding was applied to the north and south exterior walls at the Mason W. Burt School. Part of the outside trim was scraped and painted. A faulty pipe line in this school was repaired.

In addition to the previously mentioned new ceiling in the Marie S. Howard School Auditorium, several roof leaks were removed. The south door at this school was redowelled. A new celotex covering was attached to the sidewall in the grade eight classroom. This room was painted and several ceilings were washed and whitened. All galvanized water pipe lines were replaced with copper tubing.

On an average the ordinary upkeep in the local schools costs approximately \$1,500.00 during each school year. Repairs of major proportions must be made to the Parting Ways School because this work has been delayed far too long. It is not good economy to allow any building to deteriorate. It is obviously easy to postpone action but when repairs are undertaken in such cases the expenses are that much higher.

The Trust Fund Commission approved bills for the purchase of school books totalling \$124.56. This money is part of available interest in the Russell Public School Fund. Expenditures from this Trust greatly augment our educational program.

In conclusion, I herewith recognize the assistance of the School Committee, Public School Employees and the residents of the Town of Acushnet. We are engaged in a great service, that of fostering strong educational principles among the young people of this community.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts February 2, 1948

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers and Residents of Acushnet:

At the end of another fiscal year the School Physician and Nurse submit their annual report.

At the opening of schools in September physical examinations were begun. These were completed the first week of December. Throughout December notices were sent out to the parents whose children needed further attention.

The predominating feature of these examinations was the large number of pupils requiring dental care. We have been unable to obtain a school dentist this year, but we hope to control the situation soon. We feel that the services of a dentist a few hours a week would be extremely beneficial.

State Eye Examinations were given in all schools in April and May of 1947. There were two hundred and thirty-four pupils tested of these forty-five were wearing glasses already and thirty-four failed. Notices were sent to parents where further treatments were necessary. We are pleased to say that twenty-three per cent of the pupils that failed were corrected by the end of the school year.

Diptheria inoculations were carried out in the Spring of this year. In spite of an increase of diptheria in the State our record has been clear over twenty years. Thirty-one children were inoculated at these clinics which were held the first three weeks of May.

The following indicate the departures from normal health in the 562 pupils examined for 1947:
