REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1951:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Sylvano Frates, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk.

At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman—Clement St. Amand, Jr.

Secretary-Mrs. Louise F. Taber

Agent and Inspector of Licenses—Sylvano Frates

Allen E. Weeks was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering, which appointment was duly confirmed by the State Department.

At the close of the year we did not have any cases of tuberculosis at the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital in Attleboro. Also another year has passed without a report of poliomyelitis, diphtheria and no premature births which required assistance.

The garbage collection was performed in a very satisfactory manner and very few complaints were received in connection with this collection.

Through the co-operation of the District Nurse, Miss Katherine Hartley, R.N., the dental clinic was carried on throughout most of the school year for the most needy children. A total of \$536.00 was charged for this work and \$124.25 was credited as part payment by the children, thereby the net cost to the Board of Health was approximately \$412.00. The yearly totals are as follows: 182 Fillings; 40 Extractions; 32 Prophylaxis; 20 Treatments; 4 Treatment Fillings; 5 X-rays; Total of 283 for the year 1951.

During the second week of October, 1951, an X-Ray Survey was conducted by the Bristol County Tuberculosis Health Association which was assisted by the Board of Health and several others who contributed their services in making this program a

success. We extend our thanks to everyone who donated their services for this survey. A total of 2,148 people received chest X-rays. From this group thirty-three were requested to have another X-ray which was taken at the Acushnet Hospital. The cost to the Town for this X-ray Survey was \$407.50, which included the 6th, 7th and 8th grade pupils (Public and Par. Schools)

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

For the year 1951

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

We, the Trustees of Russell Memorial Library, wish to report on the highlights of operations at the Library during the year 1951. The much needed outside repairs were completed, and with a minimum of maintenance, the outside of the building can now be kept in first-class condition.

Before attempting to renovate the lawn, it was necessary to provide adequate protection for it from children and animals playing on it, and grownups thoughtlessly taking shortcuts across it—not realizing the damage being done. A fence—chainlink—matching that of the Town Hall was erected on the west side. Maintenance should now result in a fitting frame for our beautiful library building.

We are very grateful to the Girl Scouts under Mrs. Barboza and Mrs. Goldrick for the splendid job done on the cleaning and painting of the Well-Baby Clinic Room. This was a donation to the Town as a Scout Project, and we of the Library are quite proud of the work done.

We hope during 1952 it will be possible to begin repairs on the inside of the building. Much needs to be done, but with the co-operation of the people it can gradually be accomplished.

The Board feels that possibly many people are not acquainted with the up-to-dateness of the Library, and its services in furnishing current periodicals, fiction, non-fiction, and research materials. It is YOUR building, and we wish that all the Citizens of Acushnet—young and old—would take advantage of it, and use it more freely. We also have a Long Plain Branch for

those not able to come to the main library. Suggestions for improving these services are most welcome.

This report is the twentieth in a consecutive series submitted by the writer.

There are four fields of school administration within which specific data must be recorded for the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 72. Attention will be devoted to each of these sections as they are identified within a budget for school support. As people settle in Acushnet in greater numbers facilities must be made available for a steadily increasing school attendance. The trend is clear. One extra classroom was prepared for use in 1951. It will be necessary to occupy two more classrooms in 1952. The services of two more qualified teachers will be required in September.

Realizing that new families will reside in Acushnet it is sensible to limit numbers at each grade level in each classroom that might be attended by newcomers. Next fall only one room will remain unoccupied in all schools. In a short space of time new and modern facilities must be added to the present school plant which consists of four elementary schools.

Acushnet has indeed been fortunate to send all its high school students elsewhere to obtain a secondary school education. Most of these students attend city high schools in New Bedford. The marked increase in numbers continuing their education is a source of satisfaction. Enrollment of Acushnet people in the New Bedford High School has increased 50% in a short time. In Sep-

tember of 1951 the tuition rate was fixed at \$200 per pupil per school year. This is a rate increase of \$25. The Union Street Railway Company increased the cost of one scholar's ticket to 5½c. This is an advance in rate of 32%. It is obvious that the cost of tuition and transportation will be much higher. However, it is clear that the cost of a locally supported high school would be nearly double the present level of expenditures.

We are very much interested in the progress of all Acushnet pupils in the local schools and in the out of town schools which are attended after their eighth grade graduation. The degree in which Acushnet children measure up in competition with others is a good gauge with which to measure the effectiveness of local instruction. I am pleased to report a better than average standing in the City of New Bedford. The local program of education is functioning well with a sufficient amount of time being devoted to the academic studies. It is definitely to the credit of the local teaching staff that so many Acushnet students obtain high honors within and without the town.

The thoughtful consideration of adults for a strong system of public education is solicited. To the same extent that public education is fostered to that same degree do young people more effectively become progressive citizens. Time moves along more rapidly than we realize. There is a direct association between a good education and a capacity to earn a better salary. Where salaries are at a higher level the community benefits by more readily providing better public services. A good education is an excellent investment. This is brought out forcefully in all the armed services which now consider at great length the educational record of each individual.

Your attention is drawn to the age and grade distribution chart in which departures from normal are recorded. It is of interest to note that in spite of a steady increase in enrollment the percentage of pupils who are classified as overage has reached a very low point.

The number of residents 7 years old and under 16 is a significant figure because of its use in working out the formula for state aid under Chapter 643. As the formula is most complicated may

I state that for each additional resident in this age bracket the Commonwealth reimburses the town \$65.00. This type of state aid is expected to exceed \$35,700.00 in 1952.

In any school system one should constantly seek effective ways to further the good interests of the children. Much less time should be devoted to school studies at home. Provision should be made for supervision of the learning process within the school. This is especially true in the first eight grades. With so many families having both parents at work and with the television programs providing diversion the tempo of living has undergone a great change which must be recognized. The nervous system of the child can absorb a minimum of extreme change. Relaxation must be had at regular intervals. This is but one of many reasons why the work load of the growing child should be restricted to school hours. At the high school level the individual is more mature and thus better equipped to study with less supervision.

Only through the persistent co-operation of parents can we emphasize such values as respect for others and the exercise of a wholesome restraint.

To the Members of the School Committee, the Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

At the end of the fiscal year of 1951, The School Physician and Nurse submit their annual report.

In contemplation of, and review of the past year and what we have done; it is a great satisfaction to feel that we have done a good job, made good progress in maintaining and advancing community health, and that we are working with people who are interested in us and the work we do. We are grateful for their kind co-operation with us.

In 1951, 490 school children were examined and notices sent for the following departures from normal health:

The State Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 505 pupils during April and May, 1951. 110 pupils with questionable results were re-tested and 27 were found to have definite Hearing Deficiencies.

The State Examination for Vision was given to 226 pupils in November and December, 1951 resulting in the discovery of 15 pupils with visual defects.

At the Baby Clinic held in the Library on the first Wednesday of each month, there has been good attendance. 311 child-

ren were examined or treated, and the following immunizations done:

Smallpox vaccinations 55 children Immunizations against Whooping Cough,
Lock-jaw and Diptheria 76 children Booster shots 11 children

Thus, a brief picture of the year's work has been given. We appreciate most heartily the complete co-operation of the Parents, School Committee, Superintendent, and Teachers.
