#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1951.

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Clement St. Amand, Jr., was sworn into office by the Town Clerk.

At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman—Clement St. Amand, Jr. Secretary—Mrs. Louise F. Taber Agent and Inspector of Licenses—Sylvano Frates.

Allen E. Weeks was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering which appointment was duly confirmed by the State Department.

At the close of the year we had one patient at the Bristcl County Tuberculosis Hospital in Attleboro, and another year has passed without a report of poliomyelitis and diphtheria. However we had one premature birth which required assistance which cost the Board of Health \$457.50 through December 31st, and this premature child is still at St. Luke's Hospital. We have been exceedingly fortunate in years past without any lengthy cases as one case can prove very costly.

The garbage collection was performed in a very satisfactory manner and very few complaints were received.

Through the cooperation of the District Nurse, Miss Katherine Hartley, R.N., the dental clinic was carried on throughout most of the school year for the most needy children. We are most grateful to Miss Hartley as the town did not see fit to reimburse her for this work for the past two years. A total of \$510.00 was charged for this work and \$77.00 was credited as part payment by the children, thereby the net cost to the Board

of Health was \$433.00. The yearly totals are as follows: 107 Fillings; 29 Treatments; 73 Extractions; 20 Prophylaxsis; 5 X-Rays and 29 Examinations. Total of 263 for the year 1952.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FOR 1952

To the Townspeople of Acushnet:

The annual report submitted herewith is the twenty-first in a consecutive series released by the writer.

The objective of this summary is to emphasize changes within the educational system and the schools during the calendar year 1952.

The teaching staff was augmented as follows:

Miss Ruth Taber was elected principal of the Long Plain School.

Mrs. Sophronia Howard was elected and assigned to grades 5 and 6 at the Long Plain School.

Mrs. Yvonne J. Parker was elected and assigned to grade 2 at the Marie S. Howard School.

Miss Jacqueline Costa was elected as a utility teacher to assist the slow readers in all schools.

There were no resignations and the number of teachers increased from seventeen to twenty. It is significant that 86 pupils enrolled in grade 1. More children enrolled in grades 1 and 2 in the Marie S. Howard School than space would properly permit. This grade combination was divided and all second year pupils were assigned to the assembly hall with Mrs. Parker in charge.

Another classroom in the Long Plain School was renovated for use by fifth and sixth grade pupils residing in the area.

Oil burning equipment was installed in the Mason W. Burt School beiler. One classroom remains vacant within this school. It is anticipated that this room will be occupied in the near future because the total enrollment continues to rise. Seventh and eighth grade students in this area now attend the Parting Ways School. The time will come when space will not permit this practice to continue.

Where it is possible enrollments are being limited to favor the educational benefit to each child. Grade 1 in the Parting Ways School has benefited much from the renovation of the classroom. A new ceiling and floor were installed and new sidewall panelling was applied. The room is much lighter and more attractive. When a child first enters school the experience is profound. Pleasant surroundings make for a happy adjustment from home to school.

As time passes it is becoming increasingly evident that modern school facilities should be provided in this town. It is a source of satisfaction that the community has authorized a three man group to survey school needs. Mr. Gerard Charest of the School Committee is Chairman of the survey body. Mr. Allan L. Rawcliffe, town clerk, is serving as secretary and the third member is Mr. Sydney H. Burrell of the town finance committee.

The Midway Bus Company ceased its operation on December 31, 1952. As an aftermath arrangements were made to transport high school students, formerly using these facilities, directly to and from school.

Inquiries are often made concerning the destination of local eighth grade pupils after completing their elementary education. The following tabulation should be of interest:

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 20, 1953

To the Members of the School Committee, the Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

At the end of the fiscal year of 1952, the School Physician and Nurse submit their annual report.

Another year has passed and it is again time to contemplate on and review our work; and after due contemplation, we feel that the job has been well done, that the community is well interested in our work and have co-operated well with us in preserving and maintaining the health of their children. community has also co-operated with us in the radical changes instituted by the State Board of Health in our methods cf examining school children;—on September 1, 1952, a new law became effective which requires us to examine school children once every four years (instead of every year), the examination to be more thorough, and preferably done in the presence of the child's mother. Thus, we examine fewer children per year, but we spend much more time on each child, and we hope to thus achieve better results. We now examine each child on entering school (the first grade), in the fourth grade, and in the eighth grade.

From January 1 to June, 1952, (under the old law), we examined 339 school children and sent notices to 91 parents for the following departures from normal health:

From September 1 to December 31, 1952, (under the new law), we examined 145 school children, 75 with their mothers present, and found the following conditions:

Heart conditions	6
Postural defects	15
Enlarged glands	6

Under this new law, the School Nurse sends a letter to the parent of the child who is to be examined, explaining that the parent can have the child examined by either the School Physician or their Family Physician, either physician to complete a certain physical examination form prescribed by the State Board of Health. (There were 19 children examined by their family physicians.) In this letter, the School Nurse also makes arrangements for an appointment between the Mother, School Child, School Physician, and School Nurse.

The State Vision Test was given to 629 school children, of whom 59 failed. 27 of these failures have been corrected.

The State Pure Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given in January and September, 1952 to 748 school children. There were 117 children re-tested and 50 were found to have Hearing Deficiencies.

At the Baby Clinic for pre-school children held in the Library on the first Wednesday of each month (except July and August), we examined or treated 267 children. 51 completed a series of inoculations against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and Tetanus. 48 children were vaccinated against Small-pox.

The Dental Clinic held by Dr. Paul Kuechler has been functioning well; the School Nurse bringing children to him regularly each week for corrective dentistry.

Thus, a busy year has been briefly outlined; it has seen much work done and many changes made. We still have some ideas for future installation—such as some arrangement for physical exercise aimed at correction of postural defects. However, it has been a pleasure to work for and with the people of this community, and we appreciate most heartily the complete co-operation of the Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent, and Teachers.
