

### **REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN**

To The Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith our annual report for the year ending December 31, 1957.

On March 11, 1957, the Board met and organized, naming Clement St. Amand, Jr. as Chairman. Mrs. Marie Viera was appointed Clerk and secretary on April 23rd.

The Board met every Monday night at 7:30 P.M. in their office at the Town Hall, to hear petitioners and to administer the various duties of their office.

- We have further found it necessary to meet at very frequent intervals during every week in an effort to catch up on the many important issues with which we have been confronted during this year.

We are also pleased to announce that this board has filed with the State Legislature a bill, which if enacted into law will qualify our Town for funds under Chapter 81 of the General Laws. This amount should be somewhere in the vicinity of nine thousand dollars a year, which will be used entirely for the maintenance and construction of roads within our Town. Representative Medeiros is handling it in the State House for us.

We have entered into providing more and better lighting for the residents of the Town. The results of initial improvements can be seen on Slocum Street and the area immediately surrounding the Town Hall. We

are in hopes that we can greatly elaborate on this program in the next several years to an extent where we feel the heavily populated areas are sufficiently and adequately lighted.

We have entered into the initial steps necessary to create and maintain a Planning Board and Planning Rules and Regulations as per your vote on the question, on the ballot in March of 1957. Base Maps and several necessary informative pamphlets have been obtained during one of our visits with State Officials in 1957.

Our Chapter 90 project this past year was the resurfacing of the Taber Hill area, and we know you are pleased with the results obtained in the type of resurfacing that we used on this project. We are definite in our opinion that surfacing of this type, although more expensive at the outset, actually saves money over the long run.

We have discussed on occasions with representatives from the Engineering firm of Fay, Spofford and Thorndike, the feasibility of this Town locating their own water supply in the North End somewhere. We are told that drilling our own well, will be substantially cheaper than erecting a standpipe at the end of the present mains, to build up pressure for future main extensions. The difference in the two plans looked something like this: For erecting standpipe on Main Street adjacent to the present end of the line, roughly \$85,000. If we drill for our own water supply, this can be done, including the drilling, necessary pumping station and roughly fifteen hundred feet of pipe to the nearest road. for approximately \$65,000 or \$20,000 cheaper. It would be logical then, even though it might entail spending \$10,000 in survey costs in locating a good water supply, to drill for our own water and own our own supply.

We have also discussed with the same firm, the sewerage necessities of this Town in conjunction with the survey made in 1954, for which this Town spent \$4,500. The Federal Government, in the summer of 1956, made available certain sums of money for cities and towns, for the construction of necessary filtering beds, etc. We find that if we can get this program going soon enough the Federal grants in our case will be around \$51,000. Going into this plan will not greatly effect the tax rate, in that at least one-half and possibly three quarters, will be paid by way of betterments assessments against the properties benefited by this type of convenience. We have not as yet set any date for initiating a plan of this type. It is still very much in the talking stages.

The Board herewith acknowledges the cooperation and assistance of all individuals and Town Departments. We were extremely pleased to see that with very few minor exceptions, that all departments stayed within their budget means. As we all know, this will make for a better, more efficiently operating Town.

Another year has gone by, and it is time once again to report on the operation of your Russell Memorial Library.

The Board of Trustees is very pleased that during the past year it was possible to redecorate the basement rooms and at a minimum cost to the taxpayers. A small portion of the cost came out of appropriated funds, and the largest part out of Trust Funds for the library.

It has been gratifying that during the year vandalism appeared to be on the downgrade. There was only one major act of vandalism—the wrecking of the electric clock by the use of "loaded" snowballs, apparently. #### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1957:

Immediately following the elections the newly elected member Sylvano Frates was sworn into office by the Town Clerk.

At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman ...... Joseph E. Lepage Secretary ..... Louise F. Taber Agent and Inspector Licenses ... Sylvano Frates

Charles Washburn was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering which appointment was duly confirmed by the State Department.

Another year has passed without a case of tuberculosis requiring hospitalization at the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital in Attleboro, and no diphtheria cases were reported. There were six premature births reported of which two cases required assistance amounting to \$432.00 A contagious disease amounted to \$260.30.

The garbage collection was handled in a very satisfactory manner, and there was a marked increase in requests for the garbage collection.

Through the cooperation of the District Nurse, Miss Katherine Hartley, R.N. the dental clinic was carried on for the most needy school children. A total of \$558.25 was paid by the Board of Health for the year. There were 131 Fillings; 26 Examinations; 41 Treatments; 22 Extractions; 26 Prophylaxsis and 16 X-rays. Total for the year 262. There were 1,468 polio immunizations and 196 Flu immunizations administered by Dr. William Jeffrey, assisted by Miss Katherine Hartley, Mrs. Florinda Reed and Mrs. Mae Collins. Also a Patch Test Program was conducted in all the schools. From a total of 896 children 873 were patch tested and only 23 refused. There were 33 positive reactions. This program was followed by a free chest x-ray program conducted in November by the Bristol County Health Association and the Board of Health. 600 residents participated in this program. All patch test reactors were x-rayed by the mobile unit. Our most grateful thanks to everyone who donated their services as well as the Acushnet Hospital for the sterilization of all equipment.

#### ACUSHNET CIVILIAN DEFENSE

The Acushnet Auxiliary Police, whose Civilian Defense Director is Jethro O. Ashley, Jr. and Liaison Officer Lionel Ferreira, have been organized since August 12, 1957.

Regular meetings are held every Monday night at Town Hall from 7:30 P.M. to 9:30 P.M. Traffic problems of the town of Acushnet are discussed thoroughly at these meetings, as well as rules and regulations pertaining to a police officer. This group consists of 17 members, all residents of the town of Acushnet, of which 14 are active and 3 reserve.

At the first meeting held on August 12, 1957 Traffic Safety Problems was the main topic and the principal speaker was Chief Hyde.

On September 8, 1957 the first duty assigned was traffic detail at all churches in Acushnet from 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 Noon. Traffic detail at schools started from September 9 to 13 (37 hours per week) consisting of a detail of 3 men, alternating each week.

On October 27, 1957 a First Aid Course was started, and after 5 weeks the group passed with flying colors, which included the Auxiliary Police, the Regular Police and Fire Department.

A Judo Class is now in preparation for the second week of January 1958. David Brodsky will be the instructor. A Target Practice Course is also under way.

From September 8, 1957 up to the present time, the Auxiliary Police of Acushnet have donated 886<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours of voluntary work.

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FOR 1957

The annual report submitted herewith is the twentysixth in a consecutive series released by the writer.

There were twenty-four meetings of the School Committee held during the year. The School Board organized for 1957 on March 6th with William Fawcett, Jr., as its Chairman.

Enrollment pressures at all grade levels continued to beset the administration. The Long Plain school facilities proved inadequate to house prospective enrollees in grades one and two. Consequently several of these pupils were assigned to the Howard and Parting Ways Schools. To make this adjustment possible a single grade one was established in the Howard School. The Special Class which had been taught in the Howard School assembly hall was disbanded in favor of a single second grade to accommodate overflow assignees. The New Bedford School Department has accepted four Special Class pupils in the Lincoln School and one in the DeValles School. Mrs. Frances E. Gifford, formerly instructing Special Class pupils, is currently teaching grade two in the Marie S. Howard School.

The New Bedford School Committee reaffirmed its policy of not accepting any nonresident ninth grade pupils after this school year which ends in June, 1958. The impact of this policy points clearly to the necessity of housing our own ninth grade people in Acushnet beginning in September, 1958. There are fifty-eight ninth graders currently enrolled at Normandin Junior High School in New Bedford. It is estimated that seventy ninth grade people will have to be accommodated in Acushnet during the next school year.

The School Committee studied this problem at great length and determined that half day classes would be necessary to make room for two large ninth grades. As no classrooms remain available it was decided to organize two eighth grades and two ninth grades on the second floor of the Parting Ways School. To permit this arrangement, fifth and sixth grade pupils in the Parting Ways School will be assigned to afternoon classes in two rooms at the Mason W. Burt School. Fifth and sixth grade pupils in the Howard and Burt Schools will attend morning classes in the same two rooms. Prospective seventh grade pupils in these three schools will attend regular classes in the Marie S. Howard School in two rooms.

Half day classes for fifth and sixth grade pupils will be taught from 8:00 A.M. to noon during the morning and from 12:15 P.M. to 4:15 P.M. during the afternoon beginning in September. School bus transportation will be altered to fit the new requirements.

Repairs to the physical plant in 1957 consisted of the renewing of one maple classroom floor in the Howard School and one eighth grade room floor in the Parting Ways School. This eighth grade room was also renovated and painted. New desk and chair standards were provided for eighth grade pupils and new classroom furniture was purchased for several Marie S. Howard School children. New heavy oil burning equipment was installed in the boiler at the Parting Ways School thus completing a changeover from the use of coal to the use of oil as heating fuel in all schools.

A shortage of drinking water in the well at the Long Plain School created an emergency in this respect. On October 21, 1957 the Finance Committee met in emergency session with the School Committee and voted to transfer the sum of \$2,000 from Reserve to a Long Plain School Artesian Well Account. Subsequently an Artesian Well was provided on the Long Plain School site by Howard W. Maxim of Middleboro. Vouchers charged

by Howard W. Maxim of Middleboro. Vouchers charged to this account totalled \$1,989.63. A balance of \$10.37 remained.

An expanding school population in both elementary and secondary schools is, in substance, the basic factor contributing to increased costs in 1958. Absorbing at least 70 ninth graders in Acushnet in September, 1958 and the hiring of at least two additional instructors is but one phase of this expansion. With 58 students, now at Normandin, swelling the New Bedford High School enrollment from a current 65 to an estimated 95 at a \$375 rate, the tuition requirements will advance sharply. Once having retained ninth graders within our own school system for one full year, the allocation for tuition purposes should be reduced in 1959. Platooning of classes at the fifth and sixth grade levels in September of next year will present a real challenge in school administration.

Net cost to taxpayers for Vocational Education in 1957 was \$9,627.89.

As indicated heretofore the Vocational budget expenses will increase over 60% in 1958. The Trustees at the New Bedford Vocational School have increased the annual day school tuition rate from \$200 to \$325. The evening school tuition rate per hour has been advanced from 15¢ to 25¢. These substantial increases coupled with the largest attendance in both day and evening classes contributes to the sharp increase in costs for this type of education. It should be noted here that the state of Massachusetts reimburses the community for one-half the cost of Vocational education. This specific assistance is paid each November for prior period of one year extending from September 1st through the following August 31st. To explain this reimbursement procedure more clearly the sum of \$7,616.39 was received by the town treasurer in 1957 for the twelve month period beginning September 1, 1955 and ending August 31, 1956.

An attendance tally made in December, 1957 at the New Bedford Vocational School showed 72 students attending day classes and 63 adults enrolled in several evening school courses. These are the largest attendance figures ever previously recorded at this school.

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To digress a bit at this point your attention is directed to the age and grade distribution chart which is included early in the report of the School Committee. These are significant enrollment figures indicating a steadily growing school population. Since October 1, 1957 when the data was obtained, several new enrollees have been added to the rolls both within the town school system and at secondary schools located outside the town. It is this enrollment pressure that creates the necessity to provide additional school facilities.

An examination of the grade totals shows that three classrooms should properly be available at each level. Twenty-four rooms should be at hand to provide teaching space for grades one through eight. There are twenty classrooms in the existing school plant and one small assembly area located in the Marie S. Howard School which is currently used to instruct an overflow class of second grade children. Tie into this extreme situation the necessity of instructing our own ninth grade pupils next fall and it is easy to understand why a new school building is imperative.

The School Building Committee has been hard at work in an effort to process satisfactory preliminary school plans for a new plant designed to house all public school children at the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth grades. At a special town meeting held on Saturday, August 24, 1957 it was voted to designate an area located north of the new town garage on Middle Road as a school site. A large part of twenty-four acres set aside for school purposes is owned by the town. About seven acres of this tract is owned by Joseph and Mae Alice Andrade. The sum of \$3,500 was made available to the members of the School Building Committee to secure the services of an architect in producing proper preliminary school plans and to pay for the expenses of the group. The town further authorized the drawing of preliminary plans geared to the specific housing of public school children in grades five through nine.

It is anticipated that the approval of preliminary plans by the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission will be forthcoming shortly. Thereupon it will be possible to approach the townspeople seeking the necessary funds with which to originally construct and equip a new elementary, junior high school on the site previously set aside for such purposes.

The exceptionally fine efforts of the classroom teachers and school custodians are recognized. I am very much concerned with the prospect that several highly competent members of our staff are contemplating retirement. It will indeed be a challenge to seek out comparable competence.

I am aware of the unusual administrative problems confronting the members of the Acushnet School Committee. Their helpful cooperation is appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts Jan. 25, 1958.

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:—

We (The School Physician and Nurse) respectfully submit factual data in our annual report concerning the past year (1957).

During this year, physical examinations were given to 526 children, 312 being in the presence of their parents; indicating a high percentage of parents who are intensely interested in the progress and welfare of their children. We appreciate their co-operation. 80 children were recommended to obtain further treatment; of these, 46 completed treatment.

In these examinations, the following conditions were noted in the indicated number of cases :---

The State Vision Test was administered to 803 children, 79 of whom showed defective vision and further treatment recommended.

The State Pure Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 616 children, 14 of whom were found to have defective hearing and further care recommended.

Under the auspices of the Bristol County Health Association, a complete survey of Acushnet School Children was attempted to determine the incidence of Tuberculosis in the community—whether it be exposure to, latent, or active Tuberculosis. Of 896 requests, 23 children's parents refused to be patch-tested. Of 873 children who were patch-tested, there were 33 children who had Positive reactions (the positive reaction merely indicating that they had been exposed to Tuberculosis somewhere sometime). These 33 children were all xrayed (Chest x-rays) to eliminate the possibility of active Tuberculosis.

At the Baby Clinic for pre-school children, held in the Library on the first Wednesday of each month, we attended to 181 children, of whom 49 were vaccinated against Small-pox, and 52 received inoculations for immunization against Diphtheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus.

As part of our Polio Immunization Program (against Infantile Paralysis) using the Salk Vaccine provided by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, 1468 Polio Immunizations were given.

With the great fear of a possible epidemic of Asiatic Flu, Flu Vaccine was obtained and all employees of the Town of Acushnet who desired them, were able to obtain free immunization inoculations. Then, because we had a surplus of vaccine, it was offered to the general public. We have thus given immunization inoculations against Asiatic Flu to 196 people. Under the auspices of the Board of Health, the nurse has made 230 visits with School Children to the Dental Clinic.

This, in brief, gives the essential data of a busy year; a year in which we believe many things were accomplished and progress made. We have taken much pleasure and pride in our work, and enjoyed greatly the comradeship and co-operation of the Students, the Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent, and Teachers.
