REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF THE TOWN OF ACUSHNET FOR 1894.

The duties of your Inspector were increased the past year, by the addition of all domestic animals. As there is no slaughter house in Acushnet, I have only answered the demands made for the inspection of any other animals than the cattle. In May and October I inspected the cattle as the law required. I made 140 visits in May, inspecting 474 creatures. In October I found 531. I have found no signs of any contagious disease this year. I think there is little, if any disease, in this town, because we raise or buy from surrounding towns most of our cattle.
